Tomatoes for Winter Use.—  
Scald and remove the skin,  
and boil them down so that  
one bushel of tomatoes will  
be contained in a one gallon  
jug. Stir gently while boiling,  
and when nearly boiled down  
enough add one tablespoonful  
of salt. Heat the jug to a boil-  
ing temperature and put in the  
tomatoes until it is full; then  
cork tightly, and tie a piece of  
cloth nicely over the top of the  
jug and completely cover the  
top of the jug with wax.—  
These tomatoes, when wanted  
for use, must be much diluted  
with water, one teacupful mak-  
ing a meal for a good sized  
family.
