be injurious to the growth of American manufactures, because it is a class law, arranged on the principle of "Protect this man because he owns some sheep, and ground which contains ore." There is always a special plea for protection of a special class for a special purpose. Now history teaches no lesson more plainly than that class legislation cripples trade, because trade seeks myriads of channels, some of which are necessarily blocked up by legislation which is made in the interest of individuals. And, though the party newspapers do not seem aware of it, there is a strong feeling of opposition to the present system among the very men who are supposed to be specially benefitted by it, I mean the manufacturers and the skilled laborers. They are discovering, and many of them had discovered, that the time for a high protective tariff in America has passed away. It was useful once; it is injurious now. What we now need is not protection but development. The American manufacturer is strong enough to take care of himself; he needs larger markets. But monopolies, like that in the carpet trade, will cling to protection, for if a knot of seven men can virtually monopolize the whole trade of the United States they will care little for foreign markets; but of course the country at large is the sufferer, not only by the advanced price of domestic carpets, but far more by the exclusion of men of moderate means from building new factories for foreign trade, all of which would need men to work in them, and all of which would be bidders for labor, which would raise in price according to the demand for it. Were this not a presidential year the mutterings of dissatisfaction among republican manufacturers would be loud and deep. If they keep in ranks it will be from fear of the Democratic policy on money matters. It depends on who is nominated and on what platform he is nominated, as to whether party ranks can be kept closed. But any how the tariff question will be vigorously discussed."
