

Bob Ingersoll thinks Congress did just right in passing the Fitz-John Porter bill. Some people have an idea, said he, that a good General with six mules and a blunder-buss can whip the world.

The Peru Sentinel favors the nomination of Hon. David Turpie, of Marion county, as the Democratic candidate for Governor of Indiana, believing him to be the best and ablest man for the position.

St. Louis Globe-Democrat: "Those protected manufacturers in Pennsylvania who 'import' laborers from Europe can hardly fail to realize that they are alienating their American workmen, and may lose their votes. No employers proclaim more vehemently than those of Pennsylvania that the tariff protects labor, giving it high remuneration and steady employment. And none are quicker to send to England and the continent for pauper laborers to take the place of American citizens who protest against reductions of wages." In another column we publish the resolutions adopted by the late Republican convention no more complimentary than deserved by Judge Hammond. We hazarded nothing in saying that in this, his old judicial circuit, he would leave his associates on the Republican State ticket far in the rear. At the Jasper County Republican Mass Convention, recently held at Rensselaer, resolutions were unanimously adopted thanking Governor Porter for the appointment of Hon. Edwin P. Hammond, of Jasper county as one of the Supreme Judges of the State, and instructing the delegates from Jasper county to the Republican State Convention, to do what they can honorably do to secure the nomination of Judge Hammond. The resolutions endorse the bounty bill and Voorhees, The Republican editor was never a soldier.

Each State is entitled to a representation therein equal to double the number of Senators and representatives in the Congress of the United States. The Democrats of each organized Territory and District of Columbia are invited to send two delegates, subject to the decision of the Convention as to their admission. All Democratic citizens of the United States, irrespective of past political associations and differences, who can unite with us in an effort for pure, economical and constitutional Government, are cordially invited to join in sending delegates to the Convention.

They Endors. Judge Hammond. At the Republican Mass Convention, held at Rensselaer, Feb. 16th, the following resolutions were read to the convention and adopted with unanimity and enthusiasm:

1. That as citizens of Jasper county, we thank Governor Porter for the appointment of our neighbor, Edwin P. Hammond, as one of the Supreme Judges of the State.

2. That we believe Judge Hammond has performed, and will perform the duties of his office with skill, fidelity and equity.

4. That we hereby request the delegates this day chosen to the Republican State Convention, to do what they can honorably do, to secure the nomination of Judge Hammond as a candidate on the State ticket for Supreme Judge from the fifth district.
