NATHANIEL SCOTT.
The oldest citizen in Jasper county, died at the residence of his son-in-law, Conway Stone, a short distance west of town, last Saturday, Feb. 26th, aged 96 years, 10 mos. and 18 days. He was born in County Donegal, Ireland, in 1790, and was brought to this country when but six years. He resided successively in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana. He came to Jasper county in 1855. He served in the war of 1812 to its close. He cast his first presidential vote for Madison and his last for Cleveland. He was twice married, first to Anna McDowell, who bore him six children and after her death to Mrs. Sara Horner, who bore him four children. Five survive him. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. D. Handley, at M. E. church, last Monday.
