If Cleveland gets the delegates from this State he will be reasonably sure of the nomination, and vice versa if Hill gets them. He replied that it was the effect of opium to which he had been addicted for many years. This may explain the consumption. Moses is the brightest man intellectually of all the prisoners. He has a wonderful command of language and of the facts stored in his brain. He was placed in the hospital because he was unable to work, and spends his time writing and reading. He is now making a translation of a few French novels, which he hopes to sell when he is released.—Boston Record.






