NOTICE is hereby given to all the citizens of the Town of Rensselaer, and Marion Township, in the county of Jasper, and State of Indiana, that I, the undersigned, George Eck, a white male inhabitant of the State of Indiana, and over the age of twenty-one years, a man of good moral character, and not in the habit of becoming intoxicated, and a fit person to be intrusted with the sale of intoxicating liquors, will make application to the Board of Commissioners of Jasper county in the State of Indiana, at the regular session of said Board of Commissioners, to be held in the Town of Rensselaer in said Jasper county, and State of Indiana, commencing Monday, the 5th day of December, A. D. 1887, for a license to sell Spirits, Wine, Malt and all other Intoxicating Liquors which may be used as a beverage, in less quantities than a quart at a time, with the privilege of allowing and permitting said Liquors to be drank on the premises where sold, and precisely located and described as follows, to-wit:
