APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO RETAIL INTOXICATING LIQUORS.

NOTICE is hereby given to all the citizens of the Town of Rensselaer, and Marion Township, in the county of Jasper, and State of Indiana, that I, the undersigned, George Eck, a white male inhabitant of the State of Indiana, and over the age of twenty-one years, a man of good moral character, and not in the habit of becoming intoxicated, and a fit person to be intrusted with the sale of intoxicating liquors, will make application to the Board of Commissioners of Jasper County in the State of Indiana, at the ext regular session of said Board of Commissioners, to be held in the Town of Rensselaer, in said Jasper County, and State of Indiana, on the 10th day of March, A. D. 1887, for a license to sell Spirits, Vines, Malt and all other Intoxicating Liquors which may be used as a beverage, in less quantities than a quart at a time, with the privilege of allowing and permitting said Liquors to be drawn on the premises where sold, and precisely located and described as follows, to-wit:

In the lower story of a two-story frame building located on lots two & land three '3" in Block numbered three '3" of the original plat of the Town of Rensselaer, Jasper County, Indiana, and more particularly described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at a point north thirty-three and one-half degrees west, eighty-seven '37" feet distant from the easterly corner of said Block numbered three '3" thence north thirty-three '37" degrees and thirty '30" minutes west, parallel with Van Rensselaer street twenty '30" feet and four '4" inches; thence south, fifty-seven '57" degrees and thirty '30" minutes west at right angles to said V. Rensselaer street, forty '40" feet and five '5" inches; thence south thirty-three '33" degrees and thirty '30" minutes east, twenty '20" feet and four '4" inches; thence north fifty-seven '57" degrees and thirty '30" minutes east forty '40" feet and five '5" inches to the place of beginning.


