ARRAIGNING THE G. O. P.

EX-SENATOR REEVE REMINDS RE-
 PUBLICANS OF A VERY UN-
 SAVORY RECORD.

The action of the President in
 calling the attention of Congress
 and the people directly to a matter
 of the greatest importance to the
 welfare of the whole country irre-
 spective of party, and his only
 appeal to them to treat the ques-
 tions involved as matters of busi-
 ness, have been met by the Assem-
 bly of Republican Clubs, just held
 in New York, as if he had thrown
 down a glove, challenging that
 party to combat, and the members
 of that Assembly—speaking for
 the Republican party—have thrown
 down a glove to signify an accept-
 ance of the challenge. They pro-
 ceeded to substitute for the Presi-
 dent's presentation to Congress and
 the people a mass of "goose feed"
 of their own manufacturing; to
 declare that to be what the Presi-
 dent said and their response to it,
 and then vaunt that party's past
 glories, its present and future
 courage, and to libel the President
 and all who agree with him—that
 is, a majority of the voters of the
 nation.

If it were not contemptible and
 disgusting it would be laughable
 to read the rhodomontade so blat-
 antly put forth in speech and res-
 olutions by that assembly. Ac-
 cording to them the President is a
 knave and a fool, and the Ameri-
 can citizens calling themselves
 Democrats, with all who support
 Mr. Cleveland, are enemies of their
 country; have been, and are en-
 gaged in seeking to destroy it, to
 erect barriers against liberty and
 progress, and unless these ravag-
 ing boasters are alone intrusted
 with the administration of govern-
 ment the nation will be destroyed.

Rational people can but wonder
 how a man like Evarts can be led
 into making or approving any such
 expressions as constitute the decla-
 rations of that assembly. Such per-
 sons can but painfully realize that
 many men like him have lost sight
 of every element of statesmanship
 in the mad pursuit of partisan no-
 toriety and personal gain. Nay,
 more than that; they have divest-
 ed themselves of all fairness, hon-
 or and patriotism. With the fact
 before them that, under the pres-
 ent administration, there has been
 more prosperity, stability and ma-
 terial progress than the country
 has ever known, they have the ef-
 frontery to charge that the admin-
 istration is destroying the country,
 and to claim credit to themselves
 of having administered the Govern-
 ment so as to make this stability and
 prosperity in spite of the Demo-
 crats to destroy it. In face of the
 fact that when their party was in
 charge of the Government they so
 managed as to steal—yes, abso-
 lutely steal—the surplus money
 largely, and drive the national flag
 from the ocean, they have the
 shameless impudence to claim that
 they found an empty treasury and
 left a full one; a nation in debt
 and without credit, and left one
 with boundless resources and credit;
 a nation without ships and left
 it with the ocean covered with ships
 and unless their party be restored
 to power national bankruptcy—
 financially and morally—will en-
 sue. They propose to establish a
 "papa" government; take posses-
 sion of schools, commerce, inland
 transportations, manufactures, carry
 on business by subsidies, and
 leave the people to foot the expens-
 es while having no voice only thro
 them.

In recounting the history of their
 party they should have been im-
 partial. They should have told of
 the murders, robberies, perjuries,
 larcenies, the usurpations, frauds,
 compounding of crimes and mis-
 demeanors, the false pretenses,
 malfeasances, and other offenses,
 of which their officials—high and
 low—were guilty continually, with
 their knowledge and without their
 condemnation, if not with their
 sanction; so continuous that all
 perceptions of truth and honesty

were perverted and lost; and the
 abnormal conditions of dishonesty
 compelled them to now continue in
 dishonesty, lying and hypocrisy, in
 their speeches and declarations in
 this assembly of Republican Clubs.

They claim credit for economy
 and honesty. Why do they not
 declare that when the rebellion
 began they could buy a gun for
 seven dollars and a suit of clothes
 for fourteen dollars to equip a sol-
 dier; and they were worth no more
 elsewhere during the war; but they
 so managed as to make the gun
 cost over twenty-seven and the suit
 of clothes over forty dollars before
 the war closed? Why do they not
 declare that they created a national
 debt of three billions of dollars,
 and within twenty years they re-
 ceived in actual money eighteen
 billions of dollars, and got away
 with it all, paying less than one
 billion of this debt they created?
 Why did they not declare that by a
 course of vicious class legislation
 and corrupt practices in the gov-
 ernment, they built up a moneyed
 and landed aristocracy in this coun-
 try—in many cases controlled by
 aliens—brought on war between
 the laborers and the capitalists,
 stole by fraud and perjury two
 hundred millions of acres of the
 public domain? Why did they not
 declare that they gave nearly five
 millions of degraded negroes nearly
 all the privileges of citizenship
 while they were wholly unable to
 comprehend or discharge its obli-
 gations, and for twenty years left
 them without protection and with-
 out providing for a free ballot and
 a fair count (for which they now
 cry), and that by means of a na-
 tional "bureau," established by
 themselves, they cheated the poor
 negro out of about two millions of
 their hard earned savings, intrusted
 to their care for safe keeping? Why
 did they declare that by every
 crime in the calendar they de-
 feated the expressed will of the
 people and stole the Presidency?

These declarations would have
 all been true, and they are matters
 of unimpeachable record, and the
 list of offenses might be truthfully
 extended indefinitely. If the list
 of criminal and vicious acts the
 Republican party and officials be-
 longing to it were guilty of while
 in charge of the Government should
 be printed in detail, it would carpet
 New York city and county.
 Yet they have the unparalleled ef-
 frontery to put forth such a decla-
 ration as the one presented by this
 assembly of clubs, and to denounce
 the majority of American voters
 as traitors and enemies of their
 country and its welfare.
