Newton County Republican:—One of the objects of the Democratic party in proposing to cut down the revenues to the lowest stage is to afford an excuse for refusing to further increase the pension list. David W. Shields, of Marion Township; Austin N. L. Ken, Union Township; William Wells, Carpenter Township; John Rya, B-rkley Township, and Frank Welsh, Jordan Township, have been selected on 'Hendricks Club' organization, for Jasper county.—The duties, outlined by the recent Conference, at Indianapolis are as follows:

First—All clubs should add to any local name which they may select the words "Hendricks League."

Second—The persons whose selection may be provided for by this conference on club organization should meet in their respective counties, and with the assistance of all Democrats who may desire to aid in the work, or who may be induced so to do, forthwith proceed to organize clubs in their several counties on the plan adopted by this conference, which clubs, so rapidly as they may be formed, shall select from their own number a committee whose special duty it shall be to encourage the further establishment of similar organizations at other points in their several counties, and so on until like clubs are created in every town and township possible.

Third—Whenever a club has organized, under the plan submitted, it shall be the duty of the Secretary thereof, without delay, to send to the Secretary of the "Democratic State Central Committee" at Indianapolis, Ind., and to the Chairman of their "Democratic County Central Committee," a list of the names, with addresses and such other information as may be required concerning the members constituting the club.

"ARTICLE I.
"This club shall be known as the club of the Hendricks League."

"ARTICLE II.
"The officers of the club shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary a Treasurer and an Executive Committee."

"ARTICLE III.
"The President and Vice-President of said club shall constitute members of an Advisory Committee, which committee shall be subject to the call of the State and County Central Committees for consultation, at such times and places as said committee shall

ARRAIGNMENT OF G. O. P.

It will not work as you expect it will, Messieurs Republicans. You will not make the people believe what you have so wickedly and unjustifiably declared. The representation of business facts so plainly put forth by Mr. Cleveland, will compel investigation; and when that is done your declarations will not pass for argument or fact. As an old Republican here the other day whispering y said to another: "Have you read Cleveland's message?" "Not carefully." "What do you think of it?" "I have not read close enough to judge yet." "Well, I think it is the thinnest thing I ever saw; but I am afraid it will take with the people." And so it has, and will. It presents no question of free trade or protection; or if one is involved, it is for free trade on what should be free, and protection for all that should have protection.

It presents only a fact There is unnecessary and unjust taxation—bringing in more money than is needed—by means of an ill-devised and unnecessary tariffs. It works irreparable evils and dangers both ways, in burthening the poor and creating a corruption fund to be used by the rich, in office and out. It is not only vicious, but dangerous. How will you revise it so as to make it more just, less vicious and dangerous? So as to make free what ought to be free and protect such industries as should be protected. This is the message. This is the proposition of the President, and no amount of dirt throwing, lying and perversion will make it appear other than what it is. Compare it with the "hog wash" put forth by your assembly of Republican clubs in New York as the proposition of the Republican party to Congress and the people, as a matter of business in government. The majority of the people will not be misled; and you will find that such contemptible demagoguery will not command respect for you among a majority of the thinking and stable business men of the Nation, whether they call themselves Republicans or Democrats.

Thank God, we have a President who regards government as business affecting all the people, and not as mere partisan management to secure and hold office only. Let the people so regard it, and use party to select officials who will continue to so regard it. If they will, the party will triumph which shows the most wisdom and honesty in public affairs.

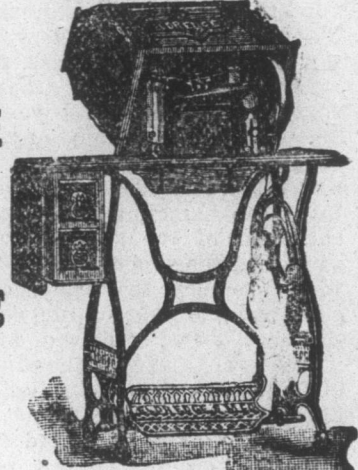

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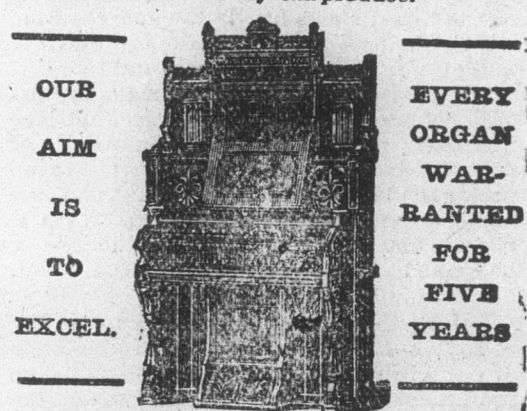
