Why The Year 1900 will not be a Leap-Year.

At the introduction of the Julian calendar, the equinox fell on the 25th of March, and at the time of the meeting of the Council of Nice, which was held in 325 A. D. the equinox fell on the 21st of March. When the reformation of the calendar was made in 1582 A. D., it had (that is the equinox had) retrograded to the 11th of March. In order to restore the equinox to its former place, Pope Gregory XIII. directed ten days to be suppressed in the calendar; and as the error in the Julian intercalation was now found to amount to three days in 400 years, he ordered the intercalations to be omitted on all the centenary years excepting those which are multiples of 400. According to the Gregorian rule of intercalation, therefore, every year of which the number is divisible by four without a remainder, is a leap year, excepting the centenary years, which are only leap years when divisible by four after omitting the two ciphers. Thus 1600 was a leap year, but 1700, 1800 and 1900 are common years; 2000 will be a leap year.—Enc. Brit.

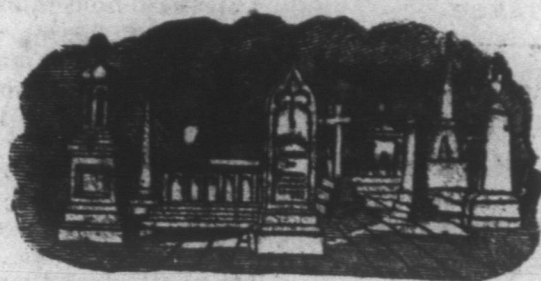
