A Fire Engine Bought.

By authority of the Town Board granted at their meeting, Monday evening, a contract was closed Tuesday with the agent of Fairbanks Morse & Co., of Chicago, for one of their Lindgren chemical fire-engines. The machine is to cost \$500 but is thought subject to approval. Two men can haul it about and four can operate it. It is claimed that it will force its fire extinguishing mixture up 100 feet of hose and throw it 100 feet further. If it is all or nearly all that it is represented to be, its acquisition will be of great advantage to the town and was a good move.

The capacity of the machine is 60 gallons of chemical fluid, each gallon of which is claimed to be equal to 800 gallons of water, for putting out a fire.

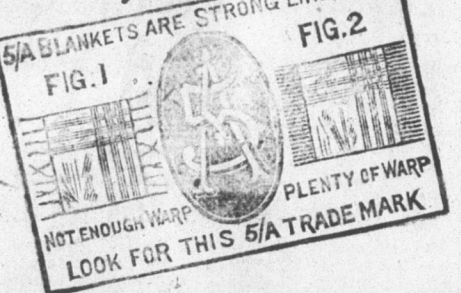

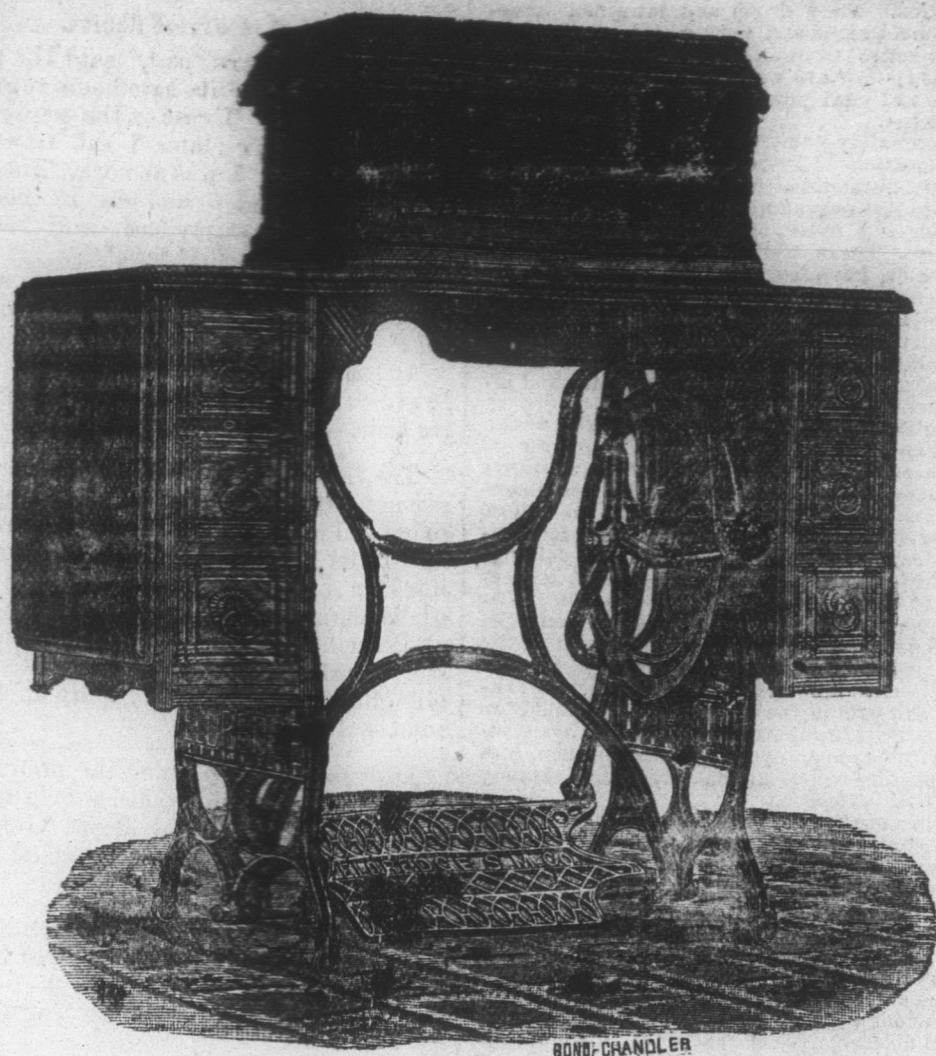

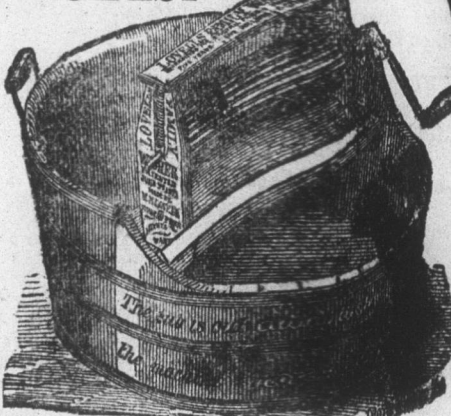
