The National Democratic Convention will be held June 5th, 1888, at St. Louis, when Grover Cleveland will be renominated to succeed himself.

THE DIFFERENCE.—The seat in Congress of Capt. White, of the Fort Wayne district, this State, was contested, but a sufficient number of Democratic members voted in his favor to secure him his seat.

Speaker Carlisle's seat was contested by a Republican, and although the Committee on election, Republicans as well as Democrats, agreed that there was nothing proven to invalidate Mr. Carlisle's election the Republican members of the House filibustered with a view of preventing a decision in the case.

Joe Medill, writing from Florida to the Chicago Tribune, says: "There remains no reason or purpose that can be truthfully alleged for retaining \$120,000,000 surplus war duties on consumers except that they are required to protect trust monopolies against foreign competition while the trusts are engaged in limiting and cornering production, pushing up prices on the public, and cutting down the wages of their imperted foreign workmen to the pauper standard. On that three legged stool rests the great monopolistic conspiracy against the farmers of the West and all other non protected people."

According to our "Republican" neighbor John Sherman, the devoted friend of 'Lize Pinkston, now mourneth over the "sweeping removals" under Mr. Cleveland's administration.

What right has John Sherman to complain? Did he at any time, when Secretary of the Treasury, appoint a single Democrat to office? Did he ever recommend a Democrat for place under a Republican administration?
