DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

CALL OF THE DEMOCRATIC STATE
CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 8, 1888.

The voters of Indiana, regardless of past political affiliations, who are desirous of co-operating with the Democracy in the support of its principles and nominees, are invited to participate in the meetings called throughout the State for the purpose of selecting representatives to attend a Delegate Convention to be held in the city of Indianapolis.

THURSDAY, APRIL 26, 1888,
for the purpose of adopting a platform of principles and the nomination of candidates to be supported for the following offices:

Governor.
Lieutenant Governor.
Three Judges of the Supreme Court.
Secretary of State.
Auditor of State.
Treasurer of State.
Reporter of the Supreme Court.
Attorney General.
Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The ratio of representation will be one delegate for each two hundred votes cast for Governor Isaac P. Gray in 1884, and one delegate for each fraction of one hundred or over.

(Jasper county is given five delegates.)

The delegates for each Congressional district, and the several committees, will meet on the evening previous to the convention, at places to be hereafter designated by this committee, for the purpose of selecting and reporting to the convention:

One Committeeman on permanent organization.

One Committeeman on Platform and Resolutions.

One Vice-President for the convention.

One Assistant Secretary for the convention.

Two delegates to National Convention.

Two alternate delegates to National Convention.

One Presidential elector.

One contingent Presidential elector.

One member of the State Central Committee.

One Committeeman on Credentials.

It will be the duty of the Committee on Permanent Organization to report a President and principal Secretary for the convention; four delegates at large, and four alternate delegates to the National Convention; two electors for the State at large, and two contingent electors, and also to recommend rules for the government of the convention.

In the ways and means committee the republican members are divided on the tobacco tax—Kelley and Reed favor its abolition, while Burrows and Brown favor its retention.

Sam Randall wants to lop off about \$80,000,000 of the whiskey and tobacco tax, and continue high duties on the necessities of life. This will suit Jim Blaine and Republicans generally, and our Billy Ovens in particular.

The Philadelphia Record says "no argument can break down the fact that manufacturers can make cheaper goods and pay better wages if they could buy cheaper wool, cheaper dye-stuffs, cheaper lumber, cheaper jute, hemp and flax, cheaper chemicals and other crude materials. And no argument will prevail," it says, "to convince the laboring man that he will be injured by cheaper food, cheaper clothing, cheaper shelter, cheaper earthenware, and cheaper utensils."

A nameless ass, anxious to show up his smartness, undertook to explain in last week's Republican that the Democratic committee was very stupid in retaining John Lefler for Hanging Grove, insisting that he was not a citizen of that township. We suggested that "If Youngster will attend the polls in Hanging Grove, he will ascertain where John Lefler votes. To which he this week responds with crushing verdancy: 'Old Stupidity, who will be there to inform me?' No unforeseen circumstances preventing, John Lefler will be there to vote. SHOVING THE QUEER.

The Indian polis Sentinel says: "John Barnes and James Sapp of Goodland, Newton county, who were brought here by Maj. Carter, charged with counterfeiting, are about twenty-five years of age, and at the time of their arrest \$400 in counterfeit bills were found on their persons. They were given a preliminary examination by commissioner Van Buren, and in default of \$1000 bail were committed to jail. The money found in their possession was mostly of a five dollar denomination and was ill-made. Maj. Carter reports that Newton county has been literally flooded with the stuff, \$2,000 of it having been put in circulation, and that even the banks of the county had accepted it. The young men are highly connected, and one of them was married only two months ago. It is thought that they did not manufacture the bills themselves, but procured them from the East."

The circulation of such an amount of the queer in a neighboring county should place our people on their guard, and prompt them to examine closely money tendered them.

Later—Counterfeit five dollar silver certificates, well calculated to deceive. The parties are committed in default of \$10,000 each.
