The Republicans have repudiated their fair words spoken four years ago, and propounded a programme of reaction and waste which they have never heretofore dared to avow.—New York Star.

No party ever won—looking at the matter from the low plane of expediency—by running away from its principles. No party of honest men should wish to win by false pretenses. 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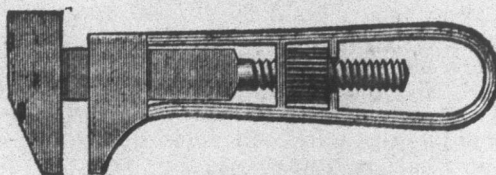
