Notice of Ditch Letting.

State of Indiana, Jasper County, ss: In the Jasper Circuit Court, January Term, A. D. 1889.

In the matter of the petition of J. Crawford and others for a ditch in Keener Township, Jasper county Indiana; it being Ditch No. 61 in Jasper Circuit Court:

NOTICE is hereby given that from this date until the 14th day of May, 1889 the undersigned Commissioner of Drainage to whom has been assigned the construction of the ditch described in the report of the Commissioners of Drainage in said matter will receive bids for the construction of said ditch.

Said work has been divided into stations of one hundred feet in length and bids for constructing said ditch or any part thereof must be by such stations.

A computation of the number of cubic yards of excavation in each station, together with the specifications as to the width and depth, has been made and will be furnished to any person interested or bidding on said work.

Said contracts will be let to the lowest and best bidders by stations. Any person to whom a contract is let will be required to enter into a written contract and give bond, with security for the performance of the work, and that he will pay all damages occasioned by his non-fulfillment of his contract.

Said ditch-letting will be near the center part of said ditch, or where the road east and west through the center of Section 24, T 32, R 7 west, crosses said ditch, in Keener township, Jasper county Indiana.

The right to reject any and all bids is reserved.
