#### RAILROAD NEWS.

Morocco Courier: On Tuesday J. K. Lee, President of the proposed Rochester, Rensselaer and St. Louis Ry., accompanied by the general contractor, Mr. Benjamin, of Boston, Mass., and Chief Engineer Nolan, were guests of the Morocco Hotel. The party was going over the route by private conveyance, and left early Wednesday morning for Gilman, Illinois. While in conversation with Mr. Benjamin, the contractor, he informed us that he would commence work on the east end of the line next week, and in all probability would do some work through this county during the latter part of the summer. He expressed the intention to have the road completed and cars running over the entire line from Rochester to Gilman, 135 miles, in one year from this date. It all seems to be "straight goods" and that the road is a dead sure thing.

ibid: "There are no flies" on the Rochester, Rensselaer and St. Louis Ry., and it is sure to be built on the proposed line through Morocco. The contractor expects to have the line completed from Rochester to Rensselaer, and the cars running, by fall, and if the weather should be mild until December 1st, he thinks he will have the grading all done through this county.

#### MEMORIAL DAY, 1889.

##### Order of March and Programme of Exercises.

Preparations for the observance of Memorial Day are pretty well completed and it is hoped that the whole public will avail themselves of the opportunity to do something, if it be ever so little, to commemorate the noble sacrifice for the public benefit, of our fallen braves. Those who donate or gather flowers should take them to the Court House at 8 o'clock a. m. on Memorial day. And all who can are invited to assist at making wreaths, bouquets, &c., from the evergreens and flowers. The Sunday Schools, Lodges and Fire Company are invited to participate and an invitation is hereby extended to the Sunday Schools of the surrounding country to attend as organized bodies and move with the procession from the Court House. The Lodges are invited to designate a member of their respective organizations to represent them in a short address.—Mrs. Healey is selected to thus represent the W. R. C. The committee to secure, instruct and manage the decoration of graves are: 1st Division, Mesdames Lydia Baylor and Mary Dexter; 2d Division, Misses Clara Reeve and Hattie Flynn; 3d Division, Mesdames Eva Hemphill and Lettie Sparling.

Organized bodies to assemble at their respective Halls at 1 o'clock p. m. and at 1:30 move to the northeasterly part of the court house square. I. O. O. F. next to Washington street, then the K. of P., Firemen, Post and Corps in order. At 1:40 the procession will form and march in the following order: Sunday Schools, Details for decorating graves, I. O. O. F., K. of P., Firemen, Soldiers, unorganized citizens on foot, Relief Corps, vehicles.

Position at Cemetery: Stage for speakers and those who lead the singing in the east half of the circle. Next to the stage, in the circle, organizations of children. From the stage leading north, the three divisions for strewing flowers; To the N. E. of circle, soldiers; N. W. of circle, W. R. C.; S. E. of circle, Fire Department; S. of circle, I. O. O. F.; S. W. of circle, K. of P.—Surrounding these but keeping an open passage way to the north, the unorganized public. The comfort of all requires that they tend rather to scatter than to crowd, and all who have anything to say are reminded that it is impossible to say it too loudly—the whole audience should be enabled to hear without having to crowd together in the heat for that purpose.

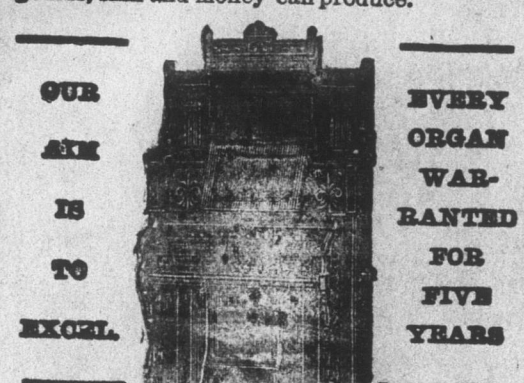

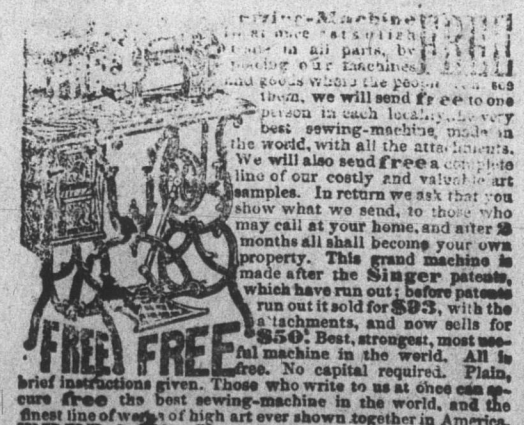

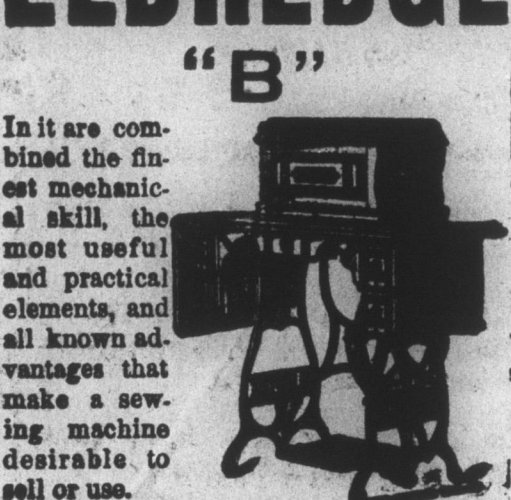
