The Boston Advertiser, published at the center of the leather industries, says:

"The low point to which the price of hides has been forced through the depression which has existed of late, seems to have tempted sellers to try to find a new market for their merchandise. During the last few weeks about 80,000 to 100,000 dry Western hides have been shipped to Europe, in order to try that market. How this new departure will turn out is at present entirely problematical, but if European tanners can use our hides to advantage it will open up a new field and tend to give a tone of steadiness to this market that has not been felt for a long time."

We have a suggestion to offer. We have it on the testimony of shoe and leather men that while we have vast quantities of the best sole leather, we have to import the finer leather used for women's and children's shoes, and for the uppers of the better class of men's shoes. The duty on these leathers is such that we cannot import them, make them up into shoes with our own heavier leathers, and then export them to South America and other countries that import their foot wear. The home market does not begin to consume all our sole leather.

If we would allow the finer leathers to come in at little or no duty we would not only have cheaper boots and shoes for ourselves, but we would enable our shoe manufacturers to work up all our sole leather at home and to manufacture boots and shoes for the export trade, which would offer a large field for the employment of American capital and American labor.—National Democrat.

Senator Ingalls proposes in a certain remote contingency to march the people of Kansas against the South. In that case Ingalls would resume, doubtless his old captaincy of "Judge Advocate General of the Kansas Militia." It is evident that the bumptious statesman of Kansas is itching for another chastisement, and it is about time for Senator Blackburn, of Kentucky, to be heard from.—Philadelphia Record.

Under the system of gerry mandering which prevails a Republican has three times the political weight of a Democrat in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Massachusetts, four times as much in Michigan, and more than eight times as much in Iowa, while in nineteen States' ten Republican and nine Democratic, the minorities have no influence in a Congressional election and no political representation in the House. It thus appears that the "suppressed" vote is not confined to the South. It is a prominent feature in the North, and it would seem that the time for considering the question of proportional representation is at hand.—Chicago News.

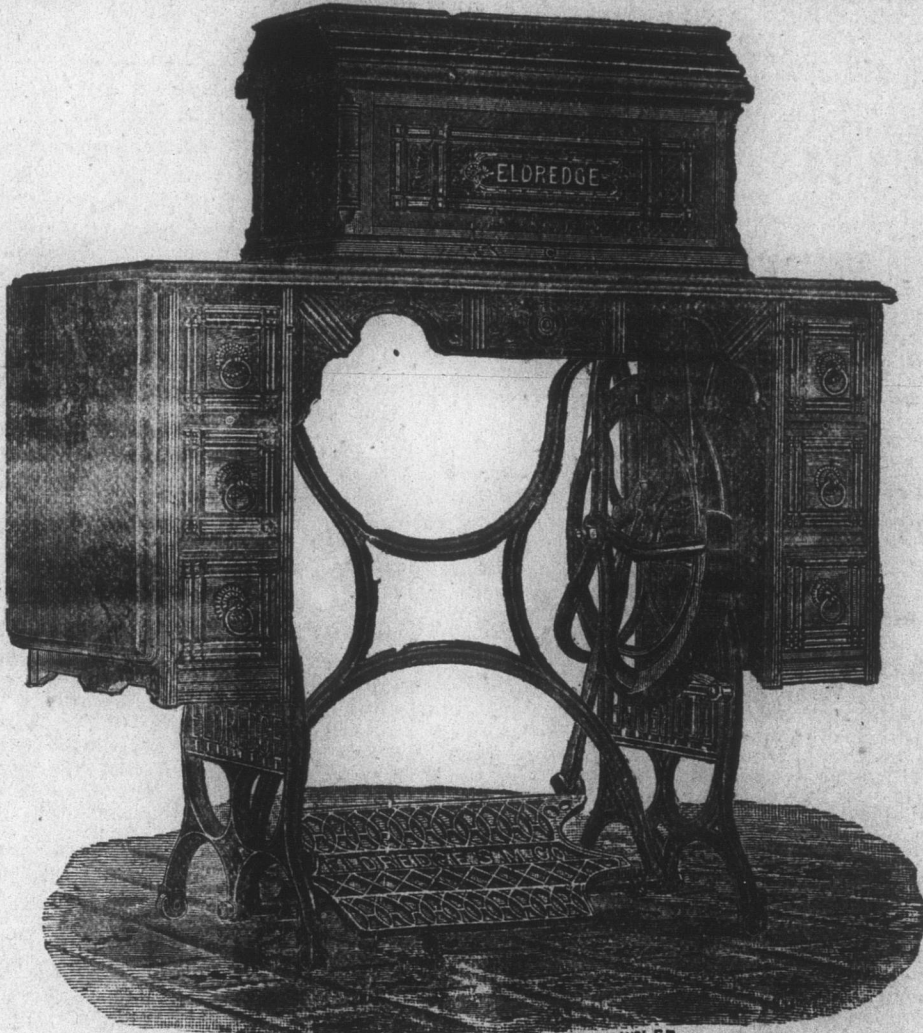
