Fire Quenching at Sea.

Investigation into the causes of the recent fires on steamships have shown that the use of a very simple means of fire extinction, the injection of carbonic acid gas into the hold, is very often not resorted to when it would be of the utmost service. It is a matter for surprise that this effective safeguard, which requires for its generation only a few barrels of marble dust and twenty to thirty gallons of hydrochloric acid, with hoseheads for the confinement of the gas and hose for its injection, is not universally employed for the preservation of life and property on the high seas, especially as in the hold of a vessel, which can be tightly closed, the principle of chemical extinction can be applied with almost certain success. The adoption of such a system would result not only in the saving of property, but it might at any time prove the means of averting loss of life.

All Watches Compases.

A few days ago I was standing by a gentleman when I expressed a wish to know which point was the north. He at once pulled out his watch, looked at it and pointed to the north. I asked him whether he had a compass attached to his watch. "All watches," he replied, "are compasses."

Then he explained to me how this was. Point the hour hand to the sun, and the south is exactly half way between the hour and the figure XII on the watch. For instance, suppose that it is 4 o'clock. Point the hand indicating 4 to the sun, and II. on the watch is exactly south. Suppose that it is 8 o'clock; point the hand indicating 8 to the sun, and the figure X on the watch is due south.
