The Republican pitches into its parti-
san co-laborer, the Lafayette Courier,

murder. A fair and thorough investiga-

surmises.

In some remarks on the Force bill Senator
Edmunds, republican, expressed his
supreme contempt for the opinions of
the people delivered recently through the
ballot boxes. It will be but a little mat-
ter of time when the people will give
Edmunds and his partisan associates to
understand that they (the people) are the
sovereigns and that public servants must
respect their will.

Senator Wolcott, republican, the other
day addressed the senate in opposition to
the Force bill. It will probably meet
deserved defeat.

Major L. A. Brown, of Mechanicsburg
is the State Purchasing Agent of the Farm-
ers' Alliance. He has established a
State purchasing bureau at Anderson.

Pullman, proprietor of the Pullman
Car Works has reduced the wages of his
employees ten per cent. And Pullman is
a loud-mouthed protectionist.

Senator Voorhees in his speech in the
Senate on the Force bill, denounced the
hypocritical cant of Harrison for honest
elections, and charged him direct with be-
ing an accessory to the corrupt methods
of Du-lay.

Fire Quenching at Sea.

Investigation into the causes of the re-
cent fires on steamships have shown that
the use of a very simple means of fire ex-
tinguishment, the injection of carbonic acid
gas into the hold, is very often not re-
sorted to when it would be of the utmost
service. It is a matter for surprise that
this effective safeguard, which requires
for its generation only a few barrels of
marble dust and twenty to thirty gallons
of hydrochloric acid, with hoseheads for
the confinement of the gas and hose for
its injection, is not universally employed
for the preservation of life and property
on the high seas, especially as in the
hold of a vessel, which can be tightly
closed, the principle of chemical exting-
uishment can be applied with almost certain
success. The adoption of such a sys-
tem would result not only in the saving
of property, but it might at any time
prove the means of averting loss of life.

All Watches Compasses.

A few days ago I was standing by a
gentleman when I expressed a wish to
know when it was the north. He at
once pulled out his watch, looked at
it and pointed to the north. I asked him
whether he had a compass attached to
his watch. "All watches," he replied,
"are compasses."

Then he explained to me how this was.
Point the hour hand to the sun, and the
south is exactly half way between the
hour and the figure XII on the watch.
For instance, suppose that it is 4 o'clock.
Point the hand indicating 4 to the sun,
and the hand indicating 12 to the sun,
suppose that it is eight o'clock; point
the hand indicating 8 to the sun, and
the figure X on the watch is due south.
My friend was quite surprised that I
did not know this.

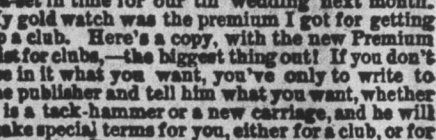
