The Democratic State Convention will be held at Indianapolis April 14th, 1892.

Indianapolis is making a heroic effort to secure the Democratic National Convention. We hope the effort may be successful.

The Democratic State Central Committee met at Indianapolis, Wednesday, and organized with Thomas Taggart, of Marion county, as chairman.

Henry A. Barnhart, of Fulton county, was selected by the District Convention held at Logansport on the 8th, to represent the Tenth District on the State Central Committee.

Speaker Crisp says there will be no step backward taken by the House of Representatives in the matter of tariff reform, and chairman Springer of the ways and means committee gives emphasis to the sentiment.

Hon. D. H. Patton, congressman from the Tenth congressional district, has favored pretty well under Speaker Crisp. Received two committee appointments. He is the fourth member of the committee on military affairs and a member on levees and improvements of the Mississippi river. JUST OUT.

A NEW AND HANDSOME "POPULAR HISTORY OF INDIANA."

A very attractive, handsome, well written and thoroughly interesting and instructive work is "The Popular History of Indiana," just given to the public by Mrs. Thomas A. Hendricks. The book contains nearly three hundred pages, is well bound, and embellished by over one hundred and ten illustrations. These illustrations include excellent portraits of all the persons who have figured prominently in the history of the state from its first settlement to the present moment; also views of historical spots, public buildings, scenery, landmarks, etc. "The Popular History of Indiana" retains for the interests of the farm and of by the tyrranical monopolies which controlled the last congress is one part of our duty; to show and to do something better than the evils we denounce is another just as binding. We have a house comprising in its majority membership men as capable and as thoroughly versed in the trying questions of our time as any who have at any period occupied seats in either branch of congress. Our efforts at reform and our struggle to relieve the country from the financial burden of expenditure may not be successful but this will not be the fault of the house of representatives.

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
