HON. D. W. VOORHEES.

The Senate having under consideration the bill (H. R. 1) to repeal a part of an act approved J. Y. 14, 1890, entitled "An act respecting the purchase of silver bullion and the issue of Treasury notes thereon, and for other purposes"—
