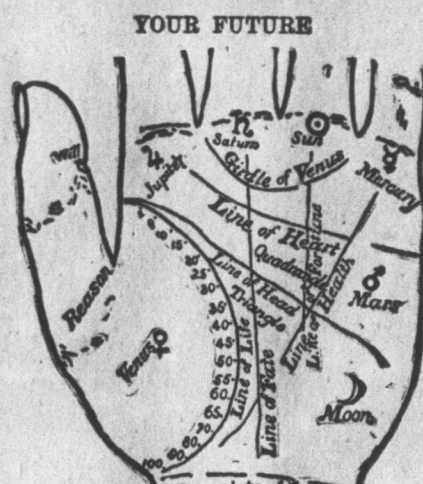
OUT OF THE ORDINARY.

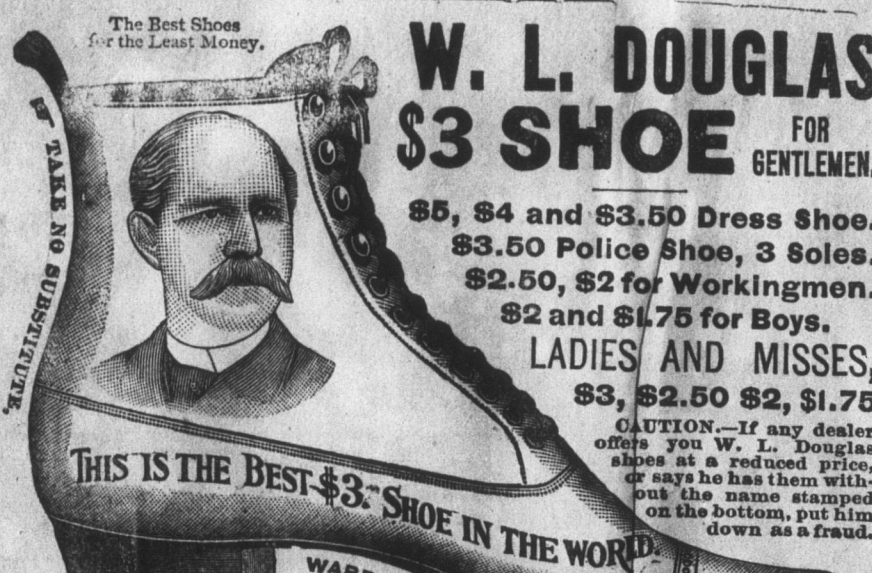

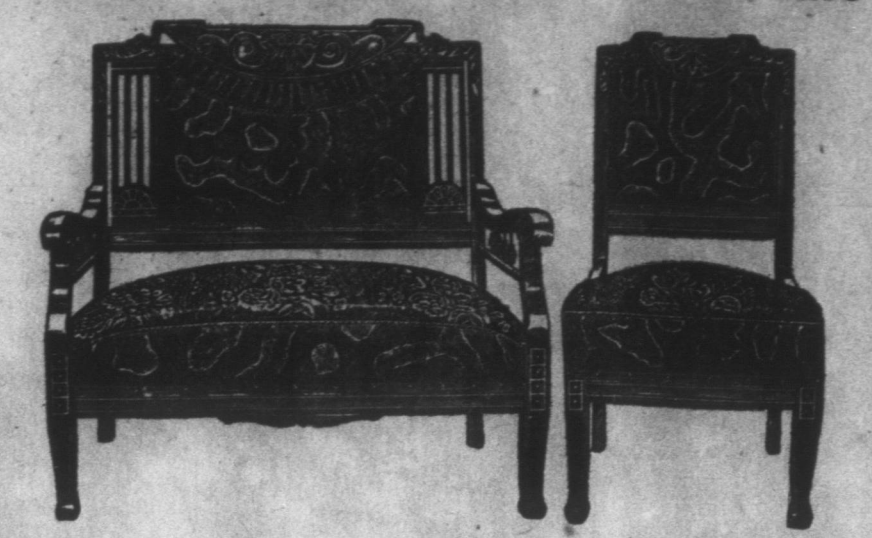

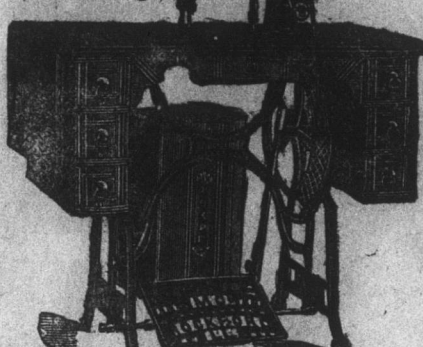
