In many parts of the state interest is centered upon the big state fair to be held at Indianapolis beginning September 16 and continuing during the week. The railroads will give a very low rate and many people will take advantage of this opportunity to visit the capital city.

The most serious thing that confronts the Democratic party today is embodied in the statement that the calm, sober, conservative members of the party have lost faith in the ability of their leaders to guide and direct the affairs of this government. The closing sentence of the above is the most sensible thing that has appeared in the Journal for many a day. Every Democrat worthy of being called such wants the nation to prosper. It is not true, however, that "the calm, sober, conservative members of the party have lost faith in the ability of their leaders to guide and direct the affairs of this government." It is the creative and impatient element in the party whose faith has been impaired. Many Democrats have manifested impatience because the work of overthrowing unwise Republican laws was not accomplished in a fortnight. It took longer than they anticipated to overthrow the McKinley tariff law—that master piece of injustice, and the silver purchasing law—the cowardly makeshift that brought on the panic. But those laws are no longer on the statute books of the nation. The people of all parties were well nigh united in demanding the repeal of the Sherman silver purchasing law. The author of the law and the president who approved

it joined in demanding its repeal. There was stronger opposition to the repeal of the McKinley tariff law but where now are there any people so foolish as to demand its re-enactment?

Was there any statesmanship displayed in turning over the taxing power of the government to private corporations which was accomplished by the passage of the McKinley tariff law? Was there any greatness displayed in passing the silver purchasing law for the purpose of holding a few silver producing states in the Republican column at the risk of bringing ruin and disaster upon the country?

If Democratic leadership is distrusted why should it be, since confidence has been restored and the country is entering upon an era of unparalleled prosperity? Logansport Papers.

The big musical day at the state fair will be on Wednesday, September 18, when the Second Regiment band of Chicago; Rogers' Goshen band, Shelbyville Military band—in all over 140 musicians will give a grand concert in front of the grand stand. The musical program will conclude with the "March of Nations," participated in by all the bands, and the military organizations of the city of Indianapolis, uniformed in grand style to represent the soldier of France, Germany, England and the United States. This will be a grand affair and will doubtless attract thousands of people.

Excursion to Chicago and Milwaukee.

On Wednesday, August 28th, the Monon Route will run an excursion to Chicago and Milwaukee. The rate from Rensselaer will be \$2 for the round trip. Coaches will be provided with plenty of ice water, besides refreshments will be served from the baggage car. A good concert band will occupy the front coach. This is the Monon's annual excursion and they are going to try to give their patrons a pleasant trip, and, with the music, the refreshments and lots of room, everybody ought to have a good time.
