## VOORHEES TO MATTHEWS.

The Former Praises the Governor's Speech at Chickamauga.

Upon the return of Governor Matthews from his trip to the dedicatory exercises on the Chickamauga battlefield he found awaiting him the following letter from Senator Voorhees, which had been written immediately upon the reading of the governor's speech at the Indiana exercises by the senator:

"Terre Haute, Sept. 19, '95.

"My Dear Governor—I wish to congratulate you on your Chickamauga speech. I have just read it in The Sentinel. It is not only the best, in my judgment, you have ever made, but it is by far the best produced by the great occasion on which it was delivered. It will greatly add to your already brilliant reputation and I rejoice in my heart that the governor of the great and beloved state of Indiana spoke so well on such a notable and splendid national day. Governor Matthews immediately replied as follows:

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,  
"Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 25, '95.

"My Dear Senator—I have read with pleasure your kind note of the 19th and thank you for its generous expressions. Such commendation as yours on this subject is to be highly valued.

"Although our last legislature provided no means for Indiana's representation on this great occasion, I still flatter myself that we, in a modest and unassuming way, made a fair showing. Other states made ample provision, Ohio \$15,000, Illinois \$20,000, other states \$5,000. Indiana, with the second largest number of military organizations engaged, and her troops in the most desperate encounters on that field, through her legislature did nothing. To have not been officially represented would have been humiliating, so we did the best we could, and I believe Indiana held her own with other states. This is a sad commentary on a republican legislature, with all their professions for the veterans. The old soldiers who bore the brunt of that hard battle deserved better at their hands.

"The gen' of all that week was Gordon's oration. It was classic, and magnificently delivered.—What a orator he is! I wish you could have been there, too.
