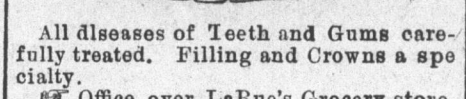

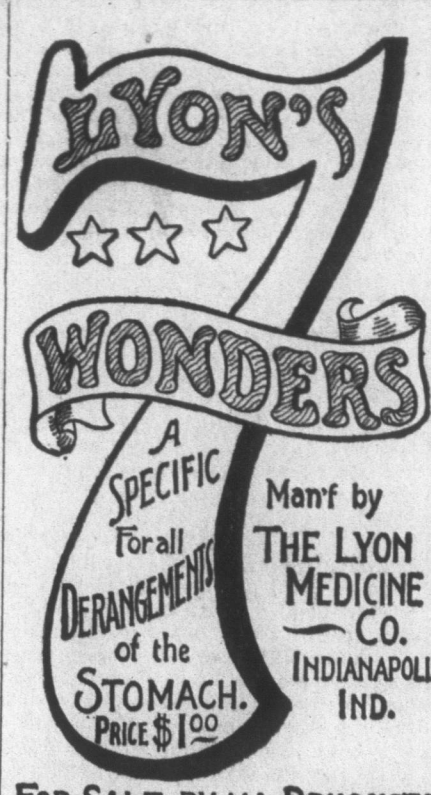

## Pledged to Reduce Taxation.

The late Democratic City Convention appointed a committee to draft and publish resolutions expressing its sense with reference to the necessity of reducing taxation. The committee present the following to which the candidates are pledged:

Recognizing the fact that all taxation must be derived from property and privileges and that the best interests of the inhabitants of this city will be conserved by reducing expenditures for all purposes to the lowest possible limit consistent with the development of a healthy growth and an enlargement of necessary public improvements;

That in the event of the election of its candidates we pledge each and all of them to use their best efforts to secure the largest possible reduction in rates of taxation for city purposes;

We pledge that the salaries of the city officers shall not be increased over those received by the officers of the Town Corporation.

## Bleeding the American Buyer.

When steel billets were selling at Pittsburgh for \$17 two weeks ago the price of English billets was \$20.65, and the duty on them is \$8.96. The rail combination, protected by a duty of \$1.84 a ton, sells to Japan for \$21.28, while the English price is \$23.08. The nailmakers, while advancing the home price by 200 per cent. in one year, sell more than 20,000,000 lbs. for export during that year and are protected by a duty of 25 per cent. How are these manufacturers to show, not that their tariff duties should be increased, but that any part of them is really needed for protection?—N. Y. Times.

## Wages and Output in Harmony.

One reason why lower wages are paid in Great Britain than in this country, by the day, is that in England the industrial output per man is less than in the United States. As an illustration, Great Britain produces annually 188,277,000 tons of coal and the United States 132,448,000 tons; in Great Britain 665,741 persons are employed in coal mining and in the United States 363,300 persons. In other words, to produce less than a fourth more than the United States Great Britain employs nearly twice as many persons.—Harrisburg Patriot.
