## A DAMNING APOLOGY.

THE MIDDLE CLASSES INJURED BY THE REPUBLICAN TARIFF.

In his final apology for the tariff for the tariff for robbery only Mr. Dingley laid the greatest stress upon "the tariff on imported luxuries or articles in the nature of luxuries." He estimated the total of this taxation upon wealth at "thirty-five or forty millions." But he was only to enumerate specifically these items:

Liquors, 1,000,000  
Fine cigars and w. p. pers., 1,000,000  
Silks, silk plushes and velvets, 3,000,000  
Silk, linen and cotton laces and embroideries, 3,000,000  
Kid gloves and jewelry, 3,200,000  
Ostrich feathers, downs and artificial flowers, 1,275,000  
Trimmings of beads, glass, etc., 400,000  
Braids and plaits of straw, 400,000  
Plate glass and china ware, 890,000  
Paints and statuary, 1,000,000  
Personal effects of American tourists, 10,000,000

To \$26,215,000

This is the official statement of the taxation of wealth, quoted directly from Mr. Dingley's speech as reported in the Congressional Record.

The wives and daughters of artisans and small shop-keepers and of men of very moderate means generally will presently convince Mr. Dingley that he is no tax-gatherer when he raises the prices of silk plushes, velvet, kid gloves, straw goods, ostrich feathers, artificial flowers, beads and glass trimmings, laces and embroideries. All of these articles are part of the "Sunday clothes" of every woman in the nation who has "Sunday clothes." It is not necessary to characterize the tax on paintings and sculpture. As for the tax on personal effects of tourists, that alone would make the law hateful to the very classes upon which the law will raise. That is, only 11 per cent. of the taxation falls upon what these bounty-givers call wealth!

And the remaining 89 per cent. falls upon necessity and comfort, the trusts, monopolies, a protected manufacturers collect on their own account hundreds upon hundreds of millions of dollars from the people who must buy in the protected market. - N. Y. World.

The Government of Japan has detailed five gentlemen to make a tour of the United States and Europe in order to secure bids for the construction of an immense steel plant in Japan. These gentlemen are now in Ohio. The plan of the Japanese Government is to purchase \$20,000,000 worth of machinery for the new factory, but to order none of it until the tour of inspection has been completed. Steel rails will be made the principal product of the new factory. The party is headed by Machitaro Oshima, director of the Imperial Steel Works in Japan.
