Sleeps Under His "Awful Epitaph."
At Vineland, N. J., the other day, was buried Jeremiah Hacker, poet, author and noted infidel. They were led to the raid by the fact that whisky was selling for five cents a glass in a large number of places on the east side, and suspecting crookedness they set a watch and readily located the illicit distillery. Republican newspapers are congratulating themselves and the people over the good crops. In this everybody will join them, for good crops are undoubtedly worthy of congratulatory mention. But there is one crop which the republicans are using all their power to diminish, and unfortunately for the people, they have it in their power to lessen that crop.

They cannot reduce the quantity of corn and wheat and oats and cotton, but they can control the quantity of money. It is just as important that the people should have a plenteous supply of money as it is that they should have a generous return from the fields of agriculture. The mines of silver and gold which abound in the United States will furnish an abundance of money if the republican politicians will open the mints to coin the bullion.

A good wheat crop at high price this year will enable many farmers to cancel their mortgages. The money will go into the coffers of the money lenders, and it will stay there. After his debts are paid the farmer will, at best, only take a fresh start. What he receives in cash for his wheat this year will not get into actual general circulation. It will not benefit the whole people.

The folly of contracting the currency is never so apparent as during the days of bountiful harvest.

The crime against the people in closing the mints is never so patent as when the farmers' bins are overflowing with grain and his pockets are empty—set the mints in motion and the mills will open. Provide the people with plenty of money with which to do business and business will be done. The growth of money should parallel the growth of crops. Then real prosperity will come.

If it is found necessary to do so, a whole army of detectives will be employed to protect our men, and if the worst comes they will be supplied with gatling guns and other equipments to convince the strikers that we mean business.

So says Loftus Cuddy, representing the mine operators of the Pittsburg district who have resolved to resume operations with non union men. These operators frankly confess that bloodshed is likely to follow.

The Pinkerton and Home stead slaughter which disgraced the Harrison administration will in all probability be paralleled in the mines about Pittsburg in these days of McKinley "prosperity." And why? Because the miners insist that they are entitled to living wages, and because they took the operators' word for it that a higher duty on coal would enable the mine owners to pay a higher price for min-

While the operators have been securing tariff benefits, and while repeated reductions in the wage scale have been made, the price of coal to the consumer has been maintained at the figures prevailing seven years ago.

When the miners have so to peacefully enforce their just rights, these operators have filled their places with alien labor and called upon Pinkerton detectives, armed to the teeth, to shoot down American
