AN INTER-OCEANIC CANAL.

A Route by Which One Could Be Successful in Conquest.
The old new route across the isthmus of Panama, separating the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, is an old one, said an engineer late yesterday. It was first discovered by De Lachance in 1800, was published in different magazines and papers in 1830, and in 1840, the first full-scale plan for the construction of the canal was published by the U. S. Navy. The route was examined by Commodore Sigsbee in 1841, who made the first favorable report upon it. The route is known for the fact that it passes through the province of Panama, in which were situated the rich gold mines of the Indians, coveted by the Spaniards in 1841. The route is a route of which only fifty miles are to be cut through the isthmus, the level of the sea, and upon the Atlantic side six miles, the other thirty miles being no difficulties. The only water is more than necessary, as the canal would be at the same level, about 10 feet above the level of the sea, the waters of the river Teyra, on the Pacific side, and of the river Caquetri on the Atlantic side. Besides there is plenty of the best building stone, immense quantities of all kinds of timber suitable not only for the construction of the canal, but also for the repair and building of vessels. The climate is healthy and insect annoying much less than along the other routes. The discovery of the new water route is genuine, but it was discovered, as stated, a quarter of a century ago by De Lachance, and the plan is not, therefore, new. It has been brought into prominence again and this time I believe that it will be put through successfully.

GOSSIP OF SERVANTS.

Malignant Practice that is Liable to Lead to Much Trouble.
Often the most vicious and malicious gossip is disseminated through the medium of defective and irresponsible servants, who carry "evil" with them, spreading it by telling tales of the faults of their former employers, or when they formerly worked, the New York Advertiser.

It is a sad story to read that remedies will not be taken to the gossip servants, for even real ladies are out-banned and it is very human to be interested in the misbehavior of others.

The writer was told the other day, a maid who has wronged innumerable families, and was always a servant, was so vicious that she really ought to be punished. 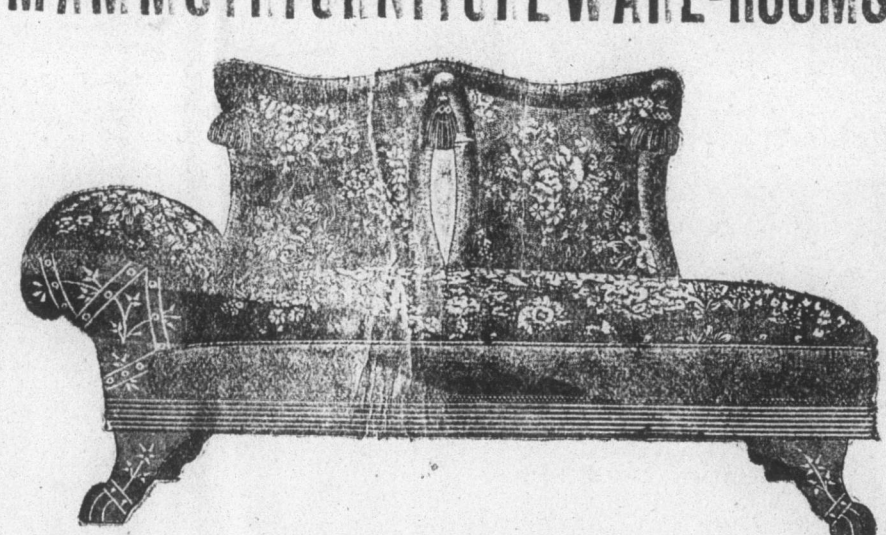

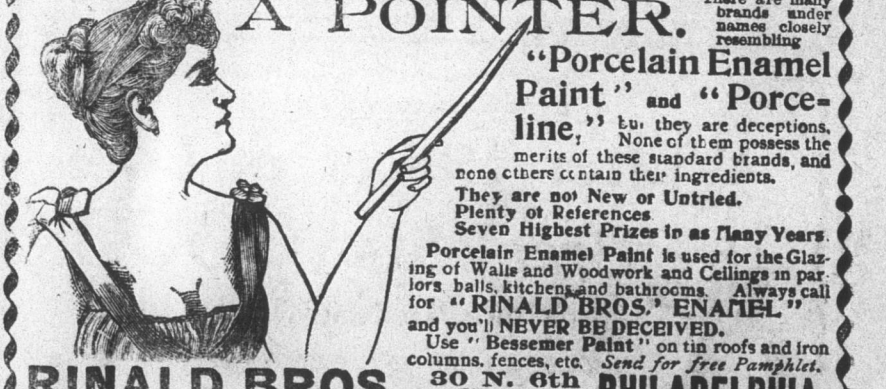

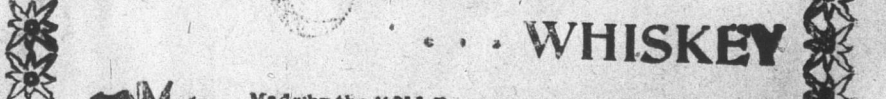
