ALL FOR LOVE.

John Stewart Takes His Own Life and is Found Three Days After the act.

It is with fear and trembling that we attempt to chronicle another suicide in the columns of our paper, as the illustrious coroner informs us that any personal mentioning of himself will be sure to result in a disagreeable manner. Of course we feel that we take great risk in placing the News before the public, and when we know that so important a item is to be given with great danger on our part, we naturally would hide ourselves a few days after to escape the wrath of the one who threatens to use an annihilator upon us. Nevertheless we must say that about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon one of the employees of the Mayers House, situated on First street found dead in his room, one of the boarders named John Stewart. Stewart went to the House on the evening of the 22nd and registered from Vandalia, Ills. He seemed to be very happy, and talked and joked with the other boarders. He was missed day before yesterday, but parties about the House supposed he had gone off for the purpose of finding work. Ed. McGee an ex-clerk of the House, yesterday went to the room for the purpose of showing it to a man, who desired board and lodging. Finding the room locked, he burst the door open. The body was found with a 32 pistol ball, back of the right ear, the revolver was found in his hand and the combined efforts of two men were required to wrench the weapon from him. He had studied the matter closely as will be seen by the facts that he laid out a fine suit of summer clothing and purchased a new white shirt. He removed the jewelry from his old shirt and placed it in the new, and made everything ready for his burial. The pocket book found in his pocket when opened at police headquarters contained but fifteen cents, no other money was found on his person. The corner gave the papers which he left behind him to the Gazette reporter and the consequence was they were not produced at the inquest, until after the evidence was all in.

The following letter found on his talk will explain the cause of his rash act: "The cause of my death is this, I have loved a lady who I can not enjoy. She was compelled to give me up; she was compelled to stay from me. I was living in the family and she became attached to me and I to her and we were very kind to each other. Miss Kimball told a parcel that I should have said; a part of his untrue; the part which made the most trouble. I love this lady dearly but cannot share life's comforts with her and that is all I want on this earth, so I die for her for this world is nothing to me. Compared with her the thought of death does not sting, but if I could see her I would be much better satisfied but I can't unless it would cause more trouble. I do not want to do that so I will leave without any trouble. I have forgiven them all and think the Lord has forgiven me all I have done. I hope the Lord will bless my loving companion. I know this will nearly break her heart but she does not know how my heart feels for her; if she did, she would come to me. She would not care for blood or anything else, she would come as true to me as steel and I have to her. I never told her an untrue word in my life. So I will close for my light is about out. I belong to the Friends Church at Hopewell Springs, Monroe county, Tennessee. I belong to the temperance society of that place. My folks are all there. Good bye to all."

The verdict of the coroner's jury was "death by his own hand." Mr. McGee has written to Tennessee to ascertain whether or not his folks are living at the place mentioned, if so to acquaint them with the sad affair.
