POLY SQUAD PRESENTS DEPLETED APPEARANCE

The squad presented a rather depleted appearance last night, there were others who did not report besides Carter, Baxter and Buck. Pirtle was unable to appear because of his bad knee and the whole team is rather the worse for wear after "big league" experience.

FEDS GRAB TWO STARS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 13.—W. D. Perritt, pitcher, and Ivy Wingo, catcher, of the St. Louis Nationals, have quit organized baseball, according to an afternoon paper today, and have signed or are signed with the Federal League.

Wingo left here last night for Cincinnati. Before leaving he refused twice to talk terms for next year with Manager Higgins.

He also had evaded a meeting with Higgins. It is understood he has signed with the Pittsburgh Federals.

Other players in the local National League who have not signed for the Federals are Alvin J. Donan, left fielder; Dan Griner, pitcher; Richard Niehaus, pitcher; and Patrick O'Connor, catcher.

Another afternoon paper says Perritt signed for three years with the Pittsburgh Federals, that he received \$3,500 in advance that Wingo has signed with the Buffalo Feds for \$6,000 a year and that he received \$3,000 in advance. This paper quotes Perritt as follows:

"I drew \$3,000 from Cardinals this season. The Pittsburgh Federals have offered me more than that as bonus money. I signed on September 20."

Wingo is quoted as saying:

"I signed with the Federals in Pittsburgh on September 29."

Boilermakers Prepare for Bitter Struggle With Wisconsin Saturday—Dope on Other Elevens.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Oct. 13.—Coach Smith put his men through a long, hard practice Monday afternoon, despite the threatening weather and slippery field. Time is now short until Purdue fans will know whether they are to get on in the honors of the western conference or again drop down the ladder and will not have to leave before the last of the week in order to be in Madison for the game with Wisconsin Saturday, leaving the coaches on two or three days to perfect the new formations and instill into the men the fighting spirit which will be necessary to carry them through the game with the Badgers.

The two hardest games of the season come within the period of one week, Wisconsin Saturday and Chicago on Sunday, latest. It is hoped by all interested that another win will be the schedule arranged in better shape.

The early part of Monday afternoon was spent with the linemen working on the blocking and the backs and ends going down under blocks and forward passes. The scrubs later were lined up against the varsity, and the regulars gained ground easily with the new system. The scrubs then started the roosters by running through the entire scrub team on the kickoff for a touchdown. 
