

TEACHER DELEGATION GOING TO CONVENTION

School Board Authorizes Selection of Twelve to Attend Meeting of State Association.

After hearing a report from C. J. Waits, superintendent of the city schools, to the effect that only two-thirds of the teachers of the city schools would go to the State Teachers' association meeting in Indianapolis, October 29, 30 and 31, the board of school trustees Friday night unanimously refused to grant a two days' vacation to allow the teachers to attend the meeting. George Greenleaf then presented a motion providing for a delegation of twelve teachers representing the different departments of the city schools, and this motion was passed. Superintendent Waits was given authority to select the delegates.

Reports from the various departments and the settling of accounts occupied a great part of the evening. Mrs. Sallie Hughes, librarian of the Emeline Fairbank library, was instructed to furnish the board with a list of the books in homes where contagious diseases have been reported. Mrs. Hughes recommended the appointment of Mary R. Phillips as librarian at the Garfield high school library and the board passed favorably on her report. The appointment will become effective November 1.

Superintendent Gwinn, of the buildings and grounds, asked that the janitors of the school buildings be given the use of a building in which to hold a banquet in the near future and this request was granted.

REV. PARKER IS RE-ELECTED MEMBER OF BAPTIST BOARD

Indiana Association Closes Annual Convention—Number of Local Pastors in Attendance.

The Rev. Clark R. Parker was for the fourth time elected a member of the board of directors of the Indiana State Baptist association, which closed its four-day annual session at Bedford yesterday. He delivered an address before the brotherhood Thursday night, Friday morning and Saturday morning as a Spiritual Force. Other delegates to the convention from Terre Haute were Revs. H. Farr Waggoner, J. L. Weeks, and D. P. Liston, and the following lay members: Isaac T. Pierson, Mrs. William Alder, Mrs. C. R. Parker, Mrs. H. F. Waggoner and Mrs. H. L. Boston.

The special feature of the convention this year was the raising of the amount of the budget, which was received difficult because of the absence on account of illness of the state superintendent, William B. Pope, of Franklin. The leadership in the campaign devolved on Rev. O. S. Barber, of Indianapolis. Approximately \$25,000 was raised for the budget, and the event was celebrated with great enthusiasm, the entire body of delegates rising and singing the association will be held with the first church of Hammond.
