

COUNTY FARMERS TO REALIZE ON WHEAT

Profits of This Year's Crops Will be Great, Especially to Those Who Held July's Harvest.

That Vigo county farmers will profit greatly as a result of the present wheat crop is assured, but how much their gain will be is a matter that cannot be definitely determined at this time, according to local grain dealers. This comes from the fact that, although the prices of wheat for this fall have shown an increase, just how much higher wheat will continue to soar is a problem for both the farmers and the buyers.

According to W. L. Sparks, of the Sparks Milling Co., the July crop of wheat was much better this year than for some time past. Many of Vigo's farmers sold their wheat immediately after it had been gathered for a price ranging from 70 cents to 80 cents a bushel. Since the European war the price of wheat has taken a tremendous advance, until today it is bringing \$1.02 per bushel. It is the farmer who has not sold all his product who will realize more this fall, according to Mr. Sparks.

"There are many farmers in this county who are known to have lots of good wheat left to market. Should the price of wheat advance, as it is expected by many to do, these farmers will be made just that much richer. Should the price lower, as some authorities think it will, then the farmer will not make so much. There is absolutely no certainty as to what the price will do. If we knew the prices would advance or if we were sure they would lower, it would mean hundreds and perhaps thousands of dollars to us. There is, however, no certainty to the market.

"The July crop for 1914 was far better in Vigo county than it has been for some time. During the past three months, the United States has exported more wheat than for any three months ever before recorded. The cause of this is the scarcity of wheat in the old country, but what caused this scarcity is a matter about which many conflicting statements are made. On July 1 we were paying 70 cents for wheat. When the war broke out on July 29, the price was at 80 cents. From then on there was a steady advance until on September 5, wheat reached \$1.10 per bushel. On Sept. 11 a slight decrease was noticed and on Oct. 5 we were paying 95 cents. Then the market started advancing and now the price of wheat is \$1.02 per bushel."

ALL INDUSTRY TO BE UNDER GOVERNMENT SUPERVISION

Such is Prediction of James Craig, Jr., President of American Meat Packers' Association.

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—James Craig, Jr., president of the American Meat Packers' association, which assembled in annual convention here today predicted the time when practically every industry in the country will be under government supervision.

"The most notable developments of the last year," he said, "respect to the supervision and control of our business by department officials probably are, first the new life that has been put into the federal food and drug law by the energy and enterprise of Dr. Alberg, of the bureau of chemistry and second, the avowed intention of the bureau of animal industry to co-operate with him in the enforcement of this law."

SEEKS CUSTODY OF CHILDREN.

Divorced Man Asks Court to Modify Wife's Decree.

Ernest Ippen, whose wife, Ida, was granted a divorce from him in October, 1913, and had the custody of their two minor children conferred on her, filed a motion in the Circuit Court Monday morning asking for a modification of the decree. He alleges in his pleadings that his wife left Terre Haute August last and went to Elkhart, where he claims she is living with Clint Trowbridge, and he asks that the decree be modified to permit him to have the custody of the children.

GERMANS GET WAR BOOTY.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The German embassy today received the following official message from Berlin:

"Headquarters reports that the Germans took at Bruges and Ostend much war material, a large number of locomotives ready for use."

"In the French war theater there are no important developments to report. In the district of Suwalki, in Russia, the Russians kept quiet yesterday, Oct. 18. The number of Russian prisoners taken near Schirwindt has increased to 4,000, and more guns have been taken. The fighting near and south of Warsaw is continuing."

TAFT TO DELIVER ADDRESS.

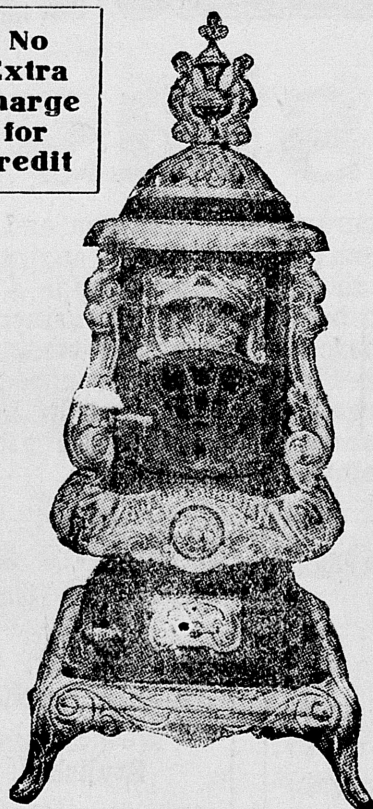

BUSINESS GETS STRONG BOOST

American automobile and auxiliary trades now believe has begun. The heavy foreign purchasing, it is stated, furthermore, will not end with the close of hostilities in Europe, according to those now participating, but may easily be expected to continue in even greater proportion after the war than is now being realized. According to one optimistic estimate of the increase in export trade which our domestic manufacturers of automobiles will realize after war concludes, the output of our plants will be quadrupled over the present capacity.

Mills Starting Up.
The textile industries have a come in for a good share of the export business already necessitated by war

operations abroad. Several large New York state underwear mills that have been closed because of the slowness of trade in this country, are now running full and over-time, in some cases, on orders received from foreign governments for use of the armies at war in Europe. In addition to the orders already reported on wool underwear, it was learned that good-sized contracts of this kind have been placed for men's cotton fleeced underwear. The amount is not divulged, but it is known to be large, and enough to keep mills busy for some time.

Sweater coat manufacturers have also put in bids for orders of 500,000 garments each from the English and French governments. Orders are expected on this business during this week. Coats costing from \$15.50 to \$18 a dozen are wanted. Khaki color is preferred, but gray will be taken, it is said. Orders of such size, of course, cannot be handled by one or two mills in the delivery time that is wanted, so the business is expected to be parcelled out among a number of mills.

Additional orders for 20,000 dozen cotton sheets for export are being figured on by mills. As previously re-

ported, orders from foreign governments have already been received on 40,000 dozen cotton sheets.

CLAUDE BOWERS RETURNS.

Terre Hautean Assigned Speaking Dates by State Committee.
Claude G. Bowers, secretary to Senator John W. Kern, returned to Indiana

Sunday and came on to Terre Haute last night, where he will take a two-day vacation before entering the campaign on Wednesday night. He stopped at Charlottesville on his way home with a letter from Congressman Levy, of New York, the present owner of Monticello, and visited the home of Jefferson on the mountain top near that old Virginia city.
During the first week he will speak

in points in Clay, Vermillion and Parke counties at the request of Congressman Moss, after which the state committee will start him south with a series of dates that takes him on the Saturday before the election to Corydon in the afternoon and Jeffersonville at night. He reports that when he left Washing-
