RIOT IN HAWESVILLE.—Two men killed and others wounded. We learn that a desperate fight took place in Hawesville, Ky., on Tuesday, growing out of a trial in court. Our informant could not furnish the particulars further than that the difficulty originated with a man named Lowe, and that two brothers were killed and several other men wounded. Lowe has resided in Hancock county for several years past, and has had the misfortune to be engaged in a great many quarrels and shooting affairs. We understand that he was not hurt.

A MATTER REQUIRING ATTENTION.—The bank of the river, below the mouth of Pigeon, and around the point in the bend of the river, is fast yielding to the action of the current and falling into the stream. In front of the U. S. Hospital, and for some distance above and below it, the abrasion, during the present rise, has been very rapid, carrying large masses of earth into the current. If something be not done soon to arrest the inroads of the river, the entire space in front of the lots, including the road, will be lost. It is a subject demanding the attention of the township and county authorities—as it is without the city limits—and one to which the attention of the Secretary of the Treasury should be called, that some measures be immediately adopted to protect the beautiful and spacious grounds belonging to the U. S. Hospital. The only mode of arresting the evil is to grade and gravel the bank. If it be not done soon there will not be space enough left in front of the lots to allow a proper inclination to the grade. It should be done during the approaching low water season, for if left till another year it may require a part of the present front lots to make the grade and allow width for a street; and these lots will not be obtained without purchase. A memorial on the subject should be forwarded to the Treasury Department. If the Government will do its part of the work, the local authorities and the owners of private property on the river bank will, we do not doubt, perform theirs.

CONGRESSIONAL.
WASHINGTON, March 1.—P. M.

SENATE.—On motion of Mr. Hunter, the Naval appropriation bill was taken up. Considerable discussion ensued on various items.

Mr. Smith O'Brien occupied a seat on a sofa on the floor, in close conference with Mr. Shields. Several Senators were introduced and entered into conversation with him.

An amendment was adopted allowing back pay to the officers suspended by the recent board, and to pay \$120,000 for the Paraguay expedition.

Mr. Hammond, from the Naval Committee, reported amendments increasing the naval appropriations—to the Portsmouth Navy Yard from \$100,000 to \$60,000, and the yard at New York, from \$20,000 to \$160,000; that at Norfolk, from \$10,000 to \$15,000; at Pensacola, from \$10,000 to \$20,000; at San Francisco, from \$10,000 to \$20,000; at San Pedro, from \$10,000 to \$20,000.

In the course of the debate, Hammond said: "We have too many navy yards," he said. "One on the Atlantic, one on the Gulf, and one on the Pacific is enough. But too many reforms could not be made at once."

Mr. Hammond's amendments were agreed to, yeas 19, nays 19.

Mr. Doolittle moved to amend to indemnify Commodore Paulding for the suits pending against him for the capture of Gen. Walker.

Mr. Hale moved a new section that no new promotions be made in the navy until the number of captains be reduced to fifty.

The bill was then reported to the Senate and all the amendments agreed to.

Mr. King voting with the majority. Mr. Seward was absent.

The Norfolk, Pensacola, and California amendments were lost. Mr. Gwin was persistent in his attempts to carry through the last named, but unsuccessfully; yeas 14, nays 23.

Mr. Hale's amendment to restrict promotions was lost. The bill was then read the third time and passed; yeas 23, nays 8.

The Senate then adjourned at 2 o'clock.

HOUSE.—On motion of Mr. Phillips, of Pa., the House suspended the rules, and passed a resolution, authorizing the President to confer on Commodore Stewart a commission as senior flag officer of the navy, on the active list, in recognition of his distinguished and meritorious services.

The House acted on the Senate amendments to the army bill which were previously considered in Committee of the Whole on the State of the Union. The House concurred in the following among others: The appropriation of \$100,000 for a military road from Fort Bend to Walla Walla; the appropriation of \$53,000 for repairs and machinery at the Springfield armory; \$5,500 for similar purposes at Harper's Ferry armory. The appropriation of \$270,000 for the payment of the Massachusetts war claim was concurred in—yeas 126, nays 23.

The House has passed the Senate bill extending the laws and judicial system of the United States over Oregon.

HOUSE.—Mr. Davis of Indiana, asked leave to introduce a bill repealing the clause in the English bill which prohibits the people of Kentucky from seceding from the Union. It appears by a census that there is a sufficient population for one member of Congress according to the federal ratio.

English remarked that it is too late in the session to consider this subject and objected to the introduction of the bill.

Davis moved a suspension of the rules. Not carried, yeas 109, nays 87, a two-thirds vote being necessary.

LOUISVILLE, March 2.—P. M.

The following are some of the particulars of the Hawesville tragedy:

An old political feud existed between Thomas S. Lowe of Hawesville, and Oliver Maxwell of Hartford, Ky. Prosecuting Attorney of that district. Lowe had threatened to cowhide Maxwell. A meeting occurred to-day. Maxwell, whilst proceeding to court at Hawesville was intercepted by Lowe, who denounced him in very insulting language. Maxwell and others fired several shots, wounding Lowe in the thigh and arm, cutting off his thumb and completely ridding his shirt. A general firing of pistols ensued from the friends of Maxwell.

John Aldridge, a friend of Lowe, was killed. Mr. Miller was shot through the thigh. Lowe has been taken to jail for protection from a mob.
