The census bureau at Washington will soon begin to give out official figures on population of the larger cities of the country. Cities the size of Rensselaer will not be reached for several weeks. It may be a few months before any information relative to population is given to the public. It rests with the director of the census, so there is nothing for Rensselaer people to do but speculate as to what the figures will show.

Most people would be surprised to learn that one dollar bills are worth almost their weight in gold. A twenty-dollar gold piece weighs 540 grains. Twenty-seven crisp, one dollar bills, fresh from the bureau of engraving and printing, weigh the same as the gold piece. It follows, of course, that the used bills gather an accumulation of various matter in passing from hand to hand that cause them to take on additional weight equal to about that of one new bill.

State examiners have reported that ten former trustees of various Cass county townships are guilty of irregularities and have shortages aggregating several thousands of dollars. Various schemes were resorted to that the trustees might indulge in graft. Embezzlement, forgery, and trickery are charged to some of the trustees, who were prominent farmers and business men. Other counties are also being heard from and a great many crooked dealings are being unearthed. Evidently Jasper is one of the cleanest counties in the state.

ORDINANCE NO. 134.

An Ordinance regulating the flushing of private sewers; prescribing a penalty for violations thereof; and declaring an emergency.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Rensselaer, Indiana, that it shall be unlawful for any person to connect any hydrant belonging to said city with any private sewer for the purpose of flushing same, except as hereinafter provided. It shall be the duty of any person desiring to flush any private sewer with city water to first pay to the treasurer of said city, the sum of four (\$4.00) dollars for each sewer to be flushed, and it shall be the duty of said treasurer to issue to the person so paying said sum, a receipt therefor showing said payment and for what purpose said payment was made, together with a description of the lot containing said sewer. The person thus obtaining said receipt shall thereupon deliver the same to the city marshal, who with the city teamster, shall proceed to flush the sewer described in said receipt, and said marshal is hereby authorized and empowered to use so much of the city fire hose as is necessary for that purpose; provided, however, that the marshal shall use only such fire hose for flushing purposes as the chief of the fire department shall designate and not otherwise. Upon the completion of said work it shall be the duty of the marshal and teamster to immediately convey said hose to the hose tower where the same shall be by them cleaned, dried and properly cared for and such fact reported by the marshal to the fire chief. The marshal thereupon deliver said receipt to the city clerk, who shall file same and make report thereof to the council at its next regular meeting.

Section 2. All money thus received by the treasurer shall be by him turned into the city treasury and credited to the corporation and water funds in the following proportions, to-wit: The one-half (1/2) part thereof to the corporation fund and the remainder to the water fund.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one (\$1.00) dollar nor more than ten (\$10.00) dollars.

Section 4. Whereas an emergency exists this ordinance shall be in full force from and after its passage and publication for two consecutive weeks in the Daily Republican of said city, the first of which publications shall be on the 12th day of July A. D. 1910, and the last publication on the 19th day of July A. D. 1910.
