## Large Number of New Republican Voters in Lake County.

Ten thousand new voters have been added to Lake county since the last election, and 45 new precincts have been created, an increase of 80 per cent over the former number.

This is the condition which confronts the politicians of the Tenth district, in which Representative J. D. Crumpacker is up for re-election according to F. Richard Schaaf, of Hammond, the republican chairman in Lake county.

Mr. Schaaf said in republican headquarters at Indianapolis that the republicans will carry the district by a larger majority than ever before. The political statisticians ascertain that most of the new voters who came from Pennsylvania to work in the mills of the United States Steel company were republican voters in their former home counties. He believes that the addition bodes well for Mr. Crumpacker and all other republican candidates. It is only a question of the amount of the majority and not of the certainty of it, in his estimation.

Megley places his assets at \$5,000 and his liabilities at \$500. The place was raided by Law and Order association detectives on April 26, and Megley later pleaded guilty to running a blind tiger. The building is owned by the Schoenhofen Brewing company of Milwaukee.

He defended a client a few days ago and won the suit, the client appearing so pleased he sat down and wrote out a check, which was returned marked "worthless" with a note to the effect that the client had never had a deposit. ### ORDINANCE NO. 124.

An Ordinance regulating the flushing of private sewers; prescribing a penalty for violations thereof, and declaring an emergency.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Rensselaer, Indiana, that it shall be unlawful for any person to connect any hydrant being used for the purpose of flushing same sewer for the purpose of flushing same, except as hereinafter provided. It shall be the duty of any person desiring to flush any private sewer with city water to first pay to the treasurer of said city, the sum of four (\$4.00) dollars for each sewer to be flushed, and it shall be the duty of said treasurer to issue to the person so paying said sum, a receipt therefor showing said payment and for what purpose said payment was made, together with a description of the lot containing said sewer. The person thus obtaining said receipt shall thereupon deliver the same to the city marshal, who with the city teamster, shall proceed to flush the sewer described in said receipt, and said marshal is hereby authorized and empowered to use so much of the city fire hose as is necessary for that purpose; provided however, that the marshal shall use only such fire hose for flushing purposes as the chief of the fire department shall immediately convey said hose to the hose tower where the same shall be by him and such fact reported by the marshal to the fire chief. The marshal shall thereupon deliver said receipt to the city clerk, who shall file same and make report thereof to the council at its next regular meeting.

Section 2. All money thus received by the treasurer shall be by him turned into the city treasury and credited to the corporation and water funds in the following proportions, to-wit: The one-half (1/2) part thereof to the corporation fund and the remainder to the water fund.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one (\$1.00) dollar nor more than ten (\$10.00) dollars.

Section 4. Whereas an emergency exists this ordinance shall be in full force from and after its passage and publication for two consecutive weeks in the Daily Republican of said city, the first of which publications shall be on the 12th day of July A. D. 1910, and the last publication on the 19th day of July A. D. 1910.


