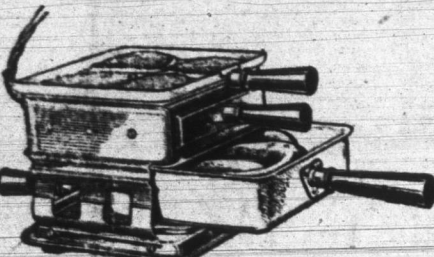

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 19.

Consideration of the peace treaty is at a standstill while President Wilson exchanges notes with Great Britain, France, and Italy over the settlement of the Adriatic question. The president's threat to withdraw the treaty from the senate if his wishes are not acceded to in the Fiume controversy has strengthened the opposition to the league of nations.

Increased rates totalling a billion and a quarter dollars will be necessary if the railroad bill is passed in its present form, Representative Barkley of Kentucky, one of the two conferees dissenting from the conference report, declared. Mr. Barkley opposes the financial features of the bill.

Senator Sherman's renewed attack today on Henry Ford resulted in protests and charges of a breach of senatorial proprieties from the Democratic side.

Senator Moses of New Hampshire asserted today that Gen. Wood as Republican presidential candidate would be able to overturn Democratic majorities in many close congressional districts in the south which could not otherwise be won for the Republican party.

LISTEN TO THE SQUAWK FROM MEDARYVILLE

It was with a great deal of amusement which later turned to disgust that we read the squawk manufactured by the Medaryville Journal in its current issue telling of the defeat of its wonder five of basket ball players in this city last week. To anyone who saw the game the wail is ridiculous. The referee spoken of is a member of the St. Joseph varsity five and was playing the game when Medaryville still labored under the impression that basket ball was the name of some new kind of breakfast food.
