Donations to the amount of \$60 were collected at the Christian Church here last Sunday for the relief of Armenian sufferers.

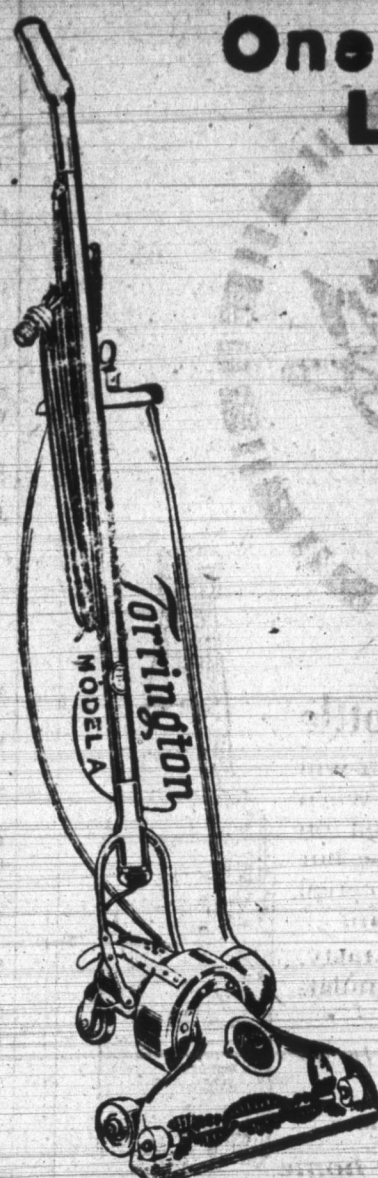
