C. B. STEWARD MAKES REPORT

WAS DELEGATE TO STATE CONFERENCE ON CHARITIES AND CORRECTION

Charles B. Steward, who was the Jasper County delegate to the state conference on Charities and Correction, at Terre Haute last week made a very interesting report to the county commissioners, copy of which is given below.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Jasper County, Indiana:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to report that pursuant to your appointment as delegate from this county, I attended the meeting of the State Conference on Charities and Corrections at Terre Haute beginning on November 14th and attended all the sessions of the conference.

The Conference was attended by over 500 delegates and addresses were delivered by the most prominent authorities in the various lines of work under consideration.

Evans Woolen of Indianapolis was elected President of the Conference and the place of meeting for the next conference was fixed at Muncie; the time to be selected by a committee appointed for that purpose.

The proceedings, addresses and discussions are being printed and it is not possible in a report of this kind to more than touch on the more important features of the reforms advocated and methods considered.

Probably the most important subject before the meeting was the matter of Child Welfare and the lax manner in which the laws are enforced by many Juvenile Courts was strongly condemned. Courts for the trial of girl delinquents, presided over by woman judge and using women juries were recommended.

Able speakers of extended experience emphasized the fact that juvenile courts and public institutions could not make a bad child good and it was agreed that better results could usually be secured by permitting the child to remain in the home, under proper supervision and making needed improvement in its environment.

The abolition of the jail except as a place for the detention of prisoners awaiting trial was urged and the confinement of insane persons in jails characterized as a relic of barbarism. The penal institutions for convicted criminals and hospitals and insane asylums for the mentally unbalanced were suggested as being more appropriate than the county jail.

Conditions in reference to the care of the wards of the state in the various penal, correctional and charitable institutions were shown to be improving but many instances were cited in which improvement could still be made. The fee system of the management of county jails was sharply criticized and its abolition recommended.

The truancy problem was discussed in all its phases and a committee was appointed to draft certain amendments to the present laws, which would extend their powers and make them more effective.

Every session of the conference was interesting and instructive and the published reports which will be distributed soon, deserve a careful reading and study. The problems considered directly affect every family and every individual in the state and the opinions of the authorities on the subjects under consideration are entitled to recognition in framing amendments to our present laws.
