WILSON GETS NOBEL  
PEACE PRIZE

The Nobel peace prize will be conferred on President Wilson on December 10, it was announced Tuesday. The ceremony will be held as usual in the Norwegian Storting, which awards the prize. The Nobel prize carries a grant of about \$40,000, which is one-fifth of the annual interest on about \$900,000, left by Alfred B. Nobel, Swedish scientist and inventor of dynamite, who died in 1896. The only two Americans who in the past have received the prize were Theodore Roosevelt in 1906 and Elihu Root in 1912.



## TO STOP THE FLOW OF IMMIGRATION

Determination of house leaders to stop during the period of reconstruction the great flood of immigration which has set in from Europe and other parts of the world was evidenced Tuesday by the action of the rules committee in reporting a special rule under which general debate on the Johnson bill would be limited to four hours and probably disposed of at one session. The rule will be called up Thursday, delay in taking it up having been agreed upon only to permit the preparation of a minority report by Representative Siegal, Republican, of New York. The Johnson bill would practically prohibit all immigration for two years.
