MURDERER SINGS  
HIS SWAN SONG

Chicago, Dec. 9.—Nicholas Viana, former choir boy, whose nineteenth birthday will come to an end a few minutes after 8 o'clock tomorrow, when he is hanged for murder, gave a farewell concert for fellow prisoners in the jail today.

Singing the "Miserere," Viana marched through the jail corridors en route to the death cell.

Viana is known as the "song bird" of the jail. He has entertained the prisoners daily for months. He was convicted of participation in several murders committed by the notorious Cardinella gang, whose leader, Sam Cardinella, is under sentence of death. Frank Campione, another member of the gang, was hanged several weeks ago and other members who turned state's evidence are serving life sentences.

GEORGE GIPP REPORTED  
TO BE DYING

George Gipp, brilliant Notre Dame halfback, who is hailed the country over as one of the season's greatest college players, is gradually growing weaker. His condition Thursday was the lowest since he was stricken with pneumonia, following the Notre Dame-Northwestern game. He is suffering now with throat trouble and the toxins of the disease are affecting the whole system.

Gloom hung over the student body when reports from the sick room were anxiously read. The blood which members of the football team offered in an effort to save the ill-fated athlete's life has not been transfused. The transfusion would do no good in the opinion of the physicians.

Sisters of St. Joseph's hospital, where Gipp is confined, and doctors attending the Notre Dame athletic idol, have denied persistent rumors that he is dying. His condition was announced as grave with little or no chance for recovery.

MIRACLE MAN MIRACLES  
ONCE TOO OFTEN

"Dr." Harry Mays, who gave up prizefighting to become a faith healer under the title of "miracle man," was placed in the Desplaines street lockup in Chicago Thursday awaiting the miraculous appearance of the \$2,500 he needs before the police will free him.

Mays was arrested at his headquarters after he had charged an inspector of the state board of registration \$2 for praying over a burn on the inspector's wrist. He was charged with violating the medical-practice act.

Mays was a prizefighter and shipbuilder until a year ago. Then he established himself as a "miracle man" in New Carlisle, Ind., where he took in nearly \$300 a day from persons who believed him able to banish illness with prayer.

The "miracle man" appeared in Rensselaer a few months ago to perform his miracles, but business proved so poor that he remained but two days.


