FORDSON TRACTOR MAKES RECORD RUN.

PLOWES FORTY DAYS AND NIGHTS; 900 ACRES WITHOUT REPAIRS

Stopping only for fuel and oil, a FORDSON tractor, owned by N. Korpus of Ludden, Dickey county, North Dakota, recently completed a record run of forty days. Three operators were assigned to the tractor, each working an eight hour shift, thus keeping the tractor in operation 24 hours a day. "Nine hundred acres were plowed without one minute's stop for repairs," says the affidavit received by the Ford Company from the FORDSON owner.

The tractor was equipped with electric lights. No special efforts were made to run a test. The farmer simply obtained his operators and set them to work, with the result that they set a new record.

The enthusiasm with which the children responded to this appeal is surely evidence not only of the true spirit of the Junior Red Cross, but also of the Christmas season.
