INCOME AND PROFITS

TAX \$650,000,000

FRANK HAM MADE DEFENDANT IN \$20,000 SUIT

Washington, Dec. 17.—Treasury officials declared tonight there was every indication that the December 13 installment of income and profits taxes would approximate Secretary Houston's estimate of \$650,000,000, notwithstanding reports of the inability of individuals and corporations in various parts of the country to meet their obligations.

Up to last night a total of \$450,000,000 had been reported to the treasury as collected and officials asserted that today's returns would probably add another \$100,000,000 to that amount. Reports are coming in steadily, but in some cases slowly and officials said it would be nearly a week before final returns were received.
