

KLAN'S NATIONAL PROGRAM OF EDUCATION

Bemoaning the Departure of Patriotism Fails to Aid U. S.

Real Citizen Is the One Who Lives and Preaches Unselfish Devotion to Country and Believes Right Makes Might.

THE PATRIOT preaches unselfish devotion to country, and practices it every hour of his life. Better had we assert the true condition into which the twin evils of the influence of an increasing foreign population and the foreignness caused by incorporation in commercial pursuits have plunged us, and seek and find, if we can, and we can if we will, the remedy.

Flaming Circle Active.

Thirty minutes before this sanguinary battle a bullet from a high-powered rifle whizzed by the head of one of the Herrin night police and struck a stone pillar in the entrance of the Gauldin drug store. This was the ball which lured the martyred Klansmen to their violent end, and the final blow of the Flaming Circle adherents scattered all over the street, that a repetition of the affray of Aug. 30 was to be staged.
