

COMMERCIAL.

Cincinnati Markets—March 29.
The river rose about 30 inches from Sunday evening up to dark last night, and was still swelling. A further increase of about 3 feet will bring it at the arch stone at the foot of Main street. We learn the rise is general in all the tributaries to Pittsburgh down.

Sugar.—A sale of 15 hds come from N. O. from landing, at an average of 43cts.

Flour.—The transactions yesterday indicated no change in prices. The sales were 386 hds in three lots, from canal, at \$4.50; 150 do from railroad; 500 do do 500 a ton brand from store, at \$4.50. The receipt of the week ending Saturday night amounted to 5,684 hds.

Provisions.—Were for good demand for small lots. Pork was limited in quantity of which the market price was not high. There is a fair inquiry for bulk, sides, and sales reported at \$17; 100 do do 100 lbs. from canal, at \$18; 500 do do 500 a ton brand, come from canal at \$18.50; 500 hds. bacon hams, come from canal at \$18.50; 500 hds. bacon hams shoulder were sold \$3.50 prime; 63 hds good soft round, at \$3.50; for shoulders, 3.50c; for sides; and hams packed.

New York, March 27.

Rye has declined to 72cts.

The sales of Provisions are only for the supply of the regular trade demand, and there is no activity in any article. Previous quotation indicate the range of the market.

The Cotton market is quiet, all parties being disposed to await the arrival of the steamer.

A speculative demand has sprung up for Tobacco, and the stock has passed entirely into second hands. The demand is still active and Kentucky is firm at 41cts to 42cts.

Letter from Mexico.

Jaranta taken Prisoner—Disturbances in Yucatan.

LOUISVILLE, MARCH 23.

The steamer Alexander Scott has arrived from New Orleans, bringing papers to the event of the 16th instant.

The Tampeco papers of the 14th learn from good authority that Pedro Jaranta was surprised and taken prisoner at Zacatlan with his forces, by a party of American troops. During the skirmish several Mexicans were killed, and the Americans afterwards reduced the town to ashes.

The papers contain no news from Vera Cruz or the City of Mexico.

From Yucatan.

Advices have been received from Yucatan to the 18th of February. The Patria gives details of the atrocities of the Indians.

At Sacanqui the savages murdered thirty-one persons, principally women and children. Their bodies were dreadfully mangled, and afterwards consumed by fire.

The Indians in the vicinity of Valladolid said far peace. The savages were preparing to attack the City of Beuchan.

In a skirmish near Texcoco the Yucatecos conquered the savages, but at Chausuexet the latter again triumphed, crying for the extermination of their foes.

In a skirmish at Kamecaheen twenty whites were killed.

Mr. Clay.

We dislike all men worshipping, as republicans should do; but in the case of Mr. Clay it was the greetings of warm hearts and disinterested friends, of admirers of sterling worth and patriotism; it was the man beyond doubt and not the candidate for future honors, who was the object of attention and respect; and this should be every citizen more than all the empty honors so warmly contested by his aspiring politicians.—New York Morning Star.
