This County.

We present our readers with the result of the election in this county. We are free to acknowledge that we are disappointed. The majority for Lane is 372. This is 300 more than we expected. Farquhar has, however, run a head of the State Ticket. The whig vote in the County has greatly increased since last year, but the democratic vote still more. Last year the entire vote for Congress was 2730. This year it is 3396, being an increase in one year of 666 votes. For this we were unprepared, and we are overwhelmed and defeated. We have nothing reliable from the other counties.

Farquhar, it will be seen, is beaten only 322, whilst the regular democratic majority in this County is about 500.

We put our paper to Press with the firm conviction that John H. Farquhar is defeated and we have to be represented by Jas. H. Lane. The same influences that operated here will doubtless operate in the other counties. It is the large increase in the vote, under our new Constitution.

FAYETTE COUNTY.
