

Eighteenth Congress.

SENATE.

DECEMBER 8.—Several written messages were received from the president of the United States, all of which, except the following, were upon executive business.

To the senate of the United States.—By an act of the last session of congress, it was made the duty of the accounting officers of the treasury to adjust and settle the accounts of Daniel D. Tompkins, late governor of the state of N. York, on his resignation and final decision of the president of the United States. The accounting officers have, in compliance with this act, reported to me a balance of \$33,190 in favor of governor Tompkins; which report I have under consideration, together with his claim to additional allowance, and should have decided on the same before the present time, had I not delayed my decision at his request. From the view which I have taken of the subject I am satisfied, considering all the circumstances of the case, that a larger sum ought to be allowed him than that reported by the accounting officers of the treasury. No appropriation, however, having been made by the act, and it appearing, by recent information from him, that the sum reported would afford him an essential accommodation at this time, the subject is submitted to the consideration of congress, with a view to that object.

LAWS PASSED THE PRESENT SESSION.

No. 1. An act to authorize a special meeting of the Board of county Commissioners for the county of Warrick.

2d. An act for the re-appointment of Hamilton county commissioners.

3d. An act to confirm the sales made by the administrators of Henry Vanderburg dec'd. late of Knox county.

4th. An act divorcing Thomas P. Lewis from his wife Elizabeth Lewis.

5th. An act for the formation of the county of Hendricks.

6th. An act appointing commissioners to locate the seat of justice of Madison county.

7. An act allowing and regulating the writ of ad quod damnum.

8. An act for the relief of Julius Johnson sheriff of Martin county.

9. An act to amend an act entitled an act to authorize the administrators of Simpson Carleton dec'd. to reassign the certificate of certain real estate, for the benefit of the heirs of the deceased, approved Jan. 9, 1823.

10. An act for the relief of James Leviston Clerk of Union county.

11. An act to change the state road from New-Albany to Princeton.

12. An act to authorize a loan for the use of the state.

13. An act for the formation of a new county out of the counties of Randolph and Delaware.

14. An act for the re-location of the seat of justice of Green county.

15. An act to dissolve the bands of matrimony between Green B. League and Nancy League his wife.

16. An act for the benefit of John Upp and Ezekias alias Ezekiel Smith.

17. An act for the relief of William Jackson.

18. An act for the incorporation of the town of Madison in the county of Jefferson.

19. An act in addition to the act entitled an act authorizing the laying off certain state roads in this state, and appropriating one hundred thousand dollars of the fund commonly called the three per cent fund for opening said roads, approved Dec. 31, 1821.

20. An act to dissolve the bands of matrimony between Willis Kelly and Dardania his wife.

21. An act regulating prisons and prison bounds.

22. A memorial of the General Assembly of the state of Indiana, to Con-

gress, on the subject of opening a canal between the waters of Lake Erie and the Wabash River.

The bill subjecting real and personal estate to execution, has not yet passed the House of Representatives. The diversity of opinions on this subject, leaves it yet quite uncertain, in what shape it may pass.

The bill to elect electors for President and Vice President, by general ticket, which passed the Senate, is now under consideration in the House of Representatives. An attempt will be made to change the features of the bill from that of a general ticket to districts; but it is not probable that such change can be effected. —Ind. Gazette.

Mr. SCHNEE of PENN. offered the following preamble and resolution in the House of Representatives on Monday last

WHEREAS we believe, that the prosperity and happiness of our country would be advanced, by the encouragement of domestic manufactures, which would give new vigor to the spirit of honest enterprise in every section of the Union, and annihilate the present state of dependency, on European countries, for the fabrics necessary to our comfort; and that this change in the policy of the government might be effected without producing pecuniary embarrassment, or imposing extraordinary burthens upon the people,

Therefore, Resolved by the General Assembly of the state of Indiana, That the members of Congress from this state, be requested to unite in any effort, that may be made, to alter the tariff so as to encourage the manufacture of domestic fabrics.

Which were read the first and second times, and referred to a committee of the whole house, and made the order of the day for to-morrow. —Ind. Gazette.

The bill to provide for the election of Electors of President and Vice-President of the U States (by general ticket) was read the third time and passed.
