



THE STARTING LINE-UP for two major league All-Star games have been named by the players and coaches of the two leagues and the American League has presented some surprises. The National League has a few names missing one might think would be in the line-up, but basically, it is pretty well chosen without much controversy.

IT APPEARS THAT THE American league team is chosen strictly on a performance basis so far this year which is the desired way to choose. Some names are missing that have been familiar to the line-up, but also some names are named as starters that belong to established stars who haven't been exactly burning up the league to date. One of these is Roger Maris. Also named is Mickey Mantle who has missed as much action as he has seen with his injuries.

THE NATIONAL LEAGUE IS missing the name of their leading hitter, Stan Musial, who is no stranger to these classics. Stan has participated in more than anyone active today, but for some reason, wasn't put in the starting line-up this year by sentiment or record to date. The National League does consist of one oddity, all right handed batters. Meanwhile, the American League supplies most of their power from the port side. This almost assures one that Sandy Koufax will start for the National League, and a right hander, Donovan, Pasquel or

maybe an outsider other than these two, will probably get the nod in the American League.

THE NATIONAL LEAGUE has an outfield of Tommy Davis, Willie Mays and Roberto Clemente to team with Orlando Cepeda at first, Bill Mazeroski at second, Dick Groat at short, and Kenny Boyer at third. Del Crandall, another man who has missed some, due to injuries, is listed to open behind the plate.

THE AMERICAN LEAGUE has Jim Gentile at first, Billy Moran at second, Luis Aparicio at shortstop and Rich Rollins at third. In the outfield it is Leon Wagner, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris. Earl Battey will start behind the plate.

THE REST OF THE TEAM as well as the entire pitching staff, is to be named by the two managers, Freddie Hutchinson in the National League, and Ralph Houk in the American League. The first game will be played in the new District of Columbia Stadium in Washington, D. C., Tuesday. The second game will be at Wrigley Field, Chicago, on July 30.

THIS GAME, ORIGINATED by the late Arch Ward of the Chicago Tribune, has been increased to two games each year simply for money. The receipts of the game go to the Players' Pension Fund, something the players themselves like to have well stocked for the years after they are out of baseball. That is the sole reason for the two games which certainly has taken a little of the glitter off of the former one game a year set-up.

THE AMERICAN LEAGUE holds a slight margin in the series as the National League has dominated play in the last few years, many times due to the stocking of the club by former American League and Yankee manager, Casey Stengel, with his pet players. Stengel never did prove his worth except with the powerhouse Yankees who many claim could have won the string of pennants and world series titles with any manager.

AT ANY RATE, HOUK AND Hutchinson will be directing the two teams Tuesday as they battle for the honor of winning the 1962 All-Star game, at least the first one. This is the one that most attention is drawn to, but actually is only half of the parade of talent put before the fans of two cities as well as the country on TV. Regardless who wins, a lot of good ball and fine players will play before the large crowds.

## Romance, Action Featured In Big Double Feature

Romance and action are featured in the double feature program opening today at the Rialto Theatre in Walkerton. A star-studded cast is featured in "Lonely Hearts" and Rory Calhoun paces the action in "The Secret of Monte Cristo" on the same bill.

Producer-writer Dore Schary has interwoven two unusual and provocative subjects, the fight between good and evil, and infidelity, as the themes of his new film, "Lonelyhearts," based on the best-selling novel by Nathanael West, and consequently has turned out a picture of absorbing power. "Lonelyhearts," features a superb cast: Montgomery Clift as an idealistic newspaper man forced to write a "lovelorn" column; Robert Ryan as his cynical editor; Myrna Loy as the editor's wife who once had an extra-marital affair; Dolores Hart as the girl who hopes to marry Clift, and Maureen Stapleton in her first motion picture role, as a frustrated wife who seeks the advice of Clift. Schary adapted the West novel to the screen and Vincent J. Donohue, who directed Schary's play, "Sunrise at Campobello," makes his movie director's bow with this film.

Montgomery Clift brings complete credibility to his role as the newspaperman who sympathizes with the problems of his correspondents and really tries to help them. Robert Ryan portrays the editor with venomous skill. This cynical, hard-headed man, devotes himself to disillusioning his idealistic employee. Myrna Loy plays the bedeviled wife of Ryan with her usual high standard of acting. Others who turn in fine performances include Jackie Coogan and Frank Maxwell.

The photography of John Alton and the musical score by Conrad Salinger contribute to make this an outstanding film.

"The Secret of Monte Cristo" is a swashbuckling, 19th century adventure drama replete with swordplay and fighting scenes, intrepid heroes and scheming villains, with two beautiful maidens adding the necessary
