Walkerton students accepted are Robert Dewhirst, cornetist; Miss Laura Divine, alto saxophonist; Miss Ruth Frailey, alto saxophonist; Miss Janet Gilmer, baritone saxophonist; Miss Carolyn Mann, clarinetist; Kent Schweder, trombonist; Charles Sherland, cornetist; and John Stahly Jr., trumpeter.

The workshop will be directed by Joseph Gremelspacher, ISC professor of music, and George Graesch, ISC associate professor of music and ISC Symphonic Band conductor. They will be assisted by a clinic staff of high school band directors, ISC music faculty and college music students. Kenneth John, New Carlisle High School band director, will be a member of the clinic staff.

The camp-type clinic workshop program to be offered will include swimming, tennis, student conducted class, theory class, dance band, listening, private lessons, sectional rehearsals, special

music movies, informal dances, and other activities.

The clinic-workshop symphonic band, comprised of the 95 high school musicians, high school directors and college music, students will appear in concert on Wednesday evening, Aug. 1, at 7:30 p.m. in the air-conditioned ISC Student Union Building auditorium. The band will be directed by the high school band directors and will perform new 1962 and late 1961 music publications which will be studied in daily rehearsals. The concert is open to the general public without admission charge.
