

Rainbow Reception Saturday Night In Walkerton Honors Diane Gindelberger

Moon River was the theme carried out in the reception for Miss Diane Gindelberger, Grand Worthy Associate Advisor of Rainbow in Indiana. Saturday evening, July 14th, at the Walkerton Elementary School. The large room was converted into a garden scene with palms, potted plants, fresh flowers, etc., along the sides. Local Students Gains Distinguished Rating At Purdue

A total of 651 students at Purdue University attained the Distinguished Rating in their work for the second semester of the 1961-62 academic year, according to the list announced by the Office of the Registrar. To achieve this honor, the student must have made a scholastic index of 5.5 or higher out of a possible 6 in all work carried in the semester.

Of the 651 students 72 made the highest possible index of 6. Under the numerical scholastic index system used at Purdue, the 6 is the equivalent of a straight A record.

The Distinguished Rating is awarded only to undergraduate students. In order to be eligible for the honor, in addition to making the 5.5 or higher index, the student must have earned a minimum of 14 hours of academic credit in the semester, must be enrolled on a regular undergraduate curriculum and must have completed all work scheduled in the semester within its regular calendar dates.

Other students from the country attaining the rating with an index of 5.5 or higher but less than 6, include: Robert Kanai, Rt. 1, sophomore in pharmacy, and Marvin Miller, 25809 Quinn Road, freshman in School of Science, Education and Humanities, both of North Liberty; and Sandra Stamm, Rt. 1, Walkerton, junior in home economics.

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
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
