THE SCENE OF THE 1964 World Series moves back to St. Louis as the Cardinals and Yankees will head into the battle for all the marbles in either one or two games. The Cards hold a 3-2 game lead following five exciting games to date. This year's series certainly is a change from last fall's as the Dodgers featured nothing but excellent pitching and the Yankees also had very fine hurling to make for a rather dull series from the excitement standpoint.

THE CARDS, LAST MINUTE winners of the National flag, look to have the best representative of their league if play in the series means anything. They were a hot club, coming off a torrid pennant chase that broke wide open in the last two weeks. Now they have continued this fine showing in the series. THE CARDS HAVE BEEN blessed with a couple of nice pitching performances and have had very timely hitting. Their three home runs in the first five games were all very clutch blows, none being wasted at all. Com-

bine with this the fine defensive play they have displayed and their timely hits and you have a team that could end it all Wednesday as they are hot and the spirit is high. The Yanks are also a team that has all three of these assets with more emphasis on the power end of things. However, their defense, usually rather tight, has been responsible for a couple of losses if the blame can be put on anything other than the Cards clutch bats.

AS IS OFTEN THE CASE, A different person has vaulted into the stars role about every game, but the consistent play of the Cardinals' young catcher, Tim McCarver, has been the real boost to the Cardinals. With such stars as Dick Groat, Ken Boyer and Bill White, you look for the big hits to come off their bats. Boyer made up for his series slump in one swing Sunday with a grand slam, only the ninth in series history. White has had a terrible time getting hits and Groat, who always used to be a number two hitter, hasn't taken the hero's crown to date. The pitching of Craig and Taylor Sunday in relief was outstanding, and Gibson's game Monday was tremendous.

FOR THE YANKS, MICKEY Mantle must be remembered for his clutch homer in the last of the ninth Saturday and his bat has been their big factor. Tommy Tresh has some real clutch hits. Bobby Richardson has had his usual flock of hits, but his couple of defensive lapses and misplays have put the goats horns on him twice, greatly benefiting the Cardinals.

THE SERIES MAY BE OVER by the time this is read, but there still is at least one game and possibly two to play at the time of this writing. You can't count the Yanks out until it is all over. Remember a few years back, 1958 to be exact, the Milwaukee Braves had the Yanks down three games to one with such stars as Spahn and Burdette on the pitching slab, only to have the Yanks come back with three in a row for the title of World's Champions. Only time will tell and the time is now as the series will be ended this week.
